s we move into the season of Epiphany, we find ourselves leaving the cradle of Jesus and joining him by the River Jordan. He will be baptized and then he will "show" us who he is as he calls disciples, heals the sick, feeds the hungry, and challenges the status quo. One of my favorite passages of Jesus calling disciples is found in the second chapter of john. He invites Phillip to follow him to Galilee, and Philip goes to find Nathaniel. Even I recorded devotions! You may not realize the extent of new skills that Dwight had to develop to produce our musical selections each week. Filming and editing and using the new programs to do it were challenging. In addition, he directed a virtual choir and put it together. It's a massive undertaking!

And who could forget Zoom meetings? We have been able to connect with one another online to plan and execute the ministries and business of the church.

I have learned that we are truly adaptable and that in the worst of circumstances, the people at Washington Street will adapt and strive for excellence!

We have also proven to be resourceful with our talents and our financial gifts. We have held Drive 'n Drops, created online videos for our children and we have availed ourselves of the loans made available to us by the government. We have used all the gifts that we received in ways that enriched our ministries and enabled us to be as adaptable as we have been.

Good things have come from 2020. What we know about 2021 is that we will need to remain flexible, adaptable, resourceful, vigilant, and hopeful. Change is expected. Let us prepare our hearts to embrace the change and to welcome all that God has planned for us in 2021.




