



#### Getting to Know

#### **Melanie Dobson**

process to obtain tenure.

his is the first time in the Rev. Dr.
Melanie Dobson's adult life that
she doesn't foresee a move.
After 16 years of serving in itinerant
ministry as an ordained United
Methodist elder, Melanie is now assistant
professor of Methodist studies at
Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary,
where she is embarking on a six-year

"I can really commit to this community, this seminary, Washington Street and Columbia to see what God's up to in this place, and I'm so glad," she said.

Melanie facilitated four sessions in June and July for members of the congregation to discern if Washington Street should join the Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN), a nonprofit organization that promotes the full inclusion of LGBTQIA<sup>†</sup> individuals in the life of the church.

Melanie said that discernment means listening for God's leading our life, usually through a practice that involves community and silence.

It is a practice she has used throughout her life and it has meant "so much" to her, particularly as practiced through spiritual direction and contemplative prayer, Melanie said.

She quoted John of the Cross, the 16th century friar and priest: "Silence is God's first language, and when we listen in silence, we can more clearly hear the voice of God."

Melanie grew up in Charlotte, where her family attended a small Methodist church. In high school, she spent her summers as a counselor at Camp Care, a camp for children with cancer. At the camp, she learned to see God in the heart of suffering, and that had a deep impact on her, Melanie said.

When she graduated from Furman in 1997 with a double major in political science and English, Melanie decided to take a year off in order to discern what her next step should be.

As part of The United Methodist Volunteers in Mission program, she went to Honduras for a year, where she taught middle school students.

When she returned to North Carolina, Melanie entered the Duke Divinity School, where she earned a master of divinity degree in 2001, and a master of theology degree in 2002. As an ordained minister, she has had a breadth of experience — in suburban churches, small town churches, city churches, as a senior pastor at a small church, and as an associate pastor at other churches.

Melanie said that in her mid-20s, her "body fell apart."

She saw lots of doctors but got no definitive diagnosis, although she was told her illness might be something that resembles multiple sclerosis. She is being evaluated to this day.

"I had deep questions around illness, suffering and what it meant to have a whole life in the midst of my disease," Melanie said. Her questions led her back to Duke, where she earned a doctorate. Her dissertation concluded that the practices we do to take care of our health are holy and lead us into the heart of God.

Some people are profoundly changed by their suffering, Melanie said, referring to the book, *Disciplines of the Spirit*, by Howard Thurman, the African-American author, philosopher, theologian, educator and civil rights leader. "Openings are made in the heart by suffering that cannot be made any other way," Melanie said, quoting from the book.

To live with strength and balance, Melanie practices yoga every morning, often using the Glo app. She is a registered yoga teacher and has taught yoga in many kinds of ministry settings.

Melanie moved to Columbia in July 2018 and began teaching at the seminary last August. She came from Myers Park UMC in Charlotte, where she was minister of faith formation.

Lynn scouted real estate for Melanie when she was looking for a house to buy and organized a moving team of church members to help move her into her home in Rosewood.

Still, Melanie used a process of discernment to pick a church — something as an appointed clergywoman she had never been able to do. After several months of visiting to get a sense of the United Methodist churches in the Columbia area, she became active at Washington Street.

Melanie is a member of the Open Door Sunday School Class, teaches Sunday school to third- and fourthgraders and taught Vacation Bible School with Ann Jessup to rising third- through rising fifth-grade students. Her son Elijah, who will be a fifth-grader at Rosewood Elementary School, was one of the VBS participants this year.

This past spring, Melanie piloted a small group – Belong – in partnership with Beth Matthews and associate minister Alston Lippert. The purpose of the group was to provide its participants with group spiritual direction.

At the seminary, Melanie teaches in the disciplines of Methodist history,

doctrine and polity, Christian ethics, theology, and spirituality.

A student body of about 70 and class sizes ranging from five to 25 enable professors to give students lots of personal attention, Melanie said.

"I know every student's name and denominational affiliation," she said. "I love supporting students as they discern their callings, and teaching, forming and nurturing them for ministry."

#### ACOLYTE TRAINING


