A Letter from the Pastor

Dear members and friends:

I am currently in Charleston for my daughter's wedding and celebrating her marriage. Otherwise I would be with you to share in these moments. These are moments that are painful for many of our members who have labored for the full inclusion of LGTBQIA individuals. I am in pain for the denomination that nurtured me from the waters of baptism through the gift of ordination and has enabled me to serve 37 years in The South Carolina Conference. With the passing of The Traditional Plan at the Called Session of The General Conference, our current Discipline remains unchanged in regards to the "practice of homosexuality" and the performance of same sex marriages by our clergy or on our campuses, and the ordination of homosexually oriented individuals.

When the 2016 General Conference called for the Bishops to develop a plan for a Way Forward, I had many hopes. I hoped that we would find a way forward in unity. I hoped that our denomination would engage in Holy Conferencing. Instead, it appeared we were trapped in a legislative process that was harmful to everyone and ultimately did not serve Christ well.

I had hoped that our denomination would learn to live beyond the ink. Like all United Methodists, I hold that the scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the sufficient rule for faith and practice. I honor, revere, and hold scripture to be the living word of God through which God continues to speak to God's people. God has spoken through scripture to all of us in every generation, but it's power is not in the ink on the page but in the Holy Spirit who gives it life and the Word of God who was with God in the beginning, creating all that exists and who is still making us and all creation new.

I had hoped that our denomination would decide to live beyond the ink. I think that within our congregation, we have decided to honor and value everyone's interpretation of Scripture, even if it is different from our own. I certainly want to learn how different people think and interpret scripture because I believe that God is still speaking to us today. I believe that God is still teaching us how to love one another as Christ has loved us and that God is still speaking to us about how to be followers of Jesus Christ in the context of our 21st century culture. I know that I am still learning and growing as a disciple of Jesus Christ. I think that here within our congregation, we are learning what it means to live beyond the ink and to embody the teachings of Jesus. Our Core Values are a significant reflection of who we are and who we are striving to be:

- a strong faith demonstrated by mission and service;
- our love for one another and a deep sense of church community;
- meaningful sermons and an inspirational ministry of sacred music;
- an historic connection with the local community;
- faith, power, and wisdom emerging from theological study; and
- an openness to diversity and inclusion as expressed in United Methodism's "open hearts, open doors, open minds" credo.

Our **Identity Statement** confirms that we have learned to live beyond the ink on the pages of *The Book of Discipline*. While no one has violated The Book of Discipline, we have decided to be inclusive of all people and to welcome every child of God's creation into the Body of Christ created by the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost: The congregation of WSUMC praises and serves God from the heart of the city in ways which reach our neighbors near and far. We welcome all who seek the love and mercy of Christ regardless of race, creed, age, gender, national origin, sexual orientation, gender identity, or economic status. We honor traditions as rooted in our history, our expression of worship, and our respect for theological curiosity. We nonetheless see vital change and ongoing renewal as essential for spiritual growth.

One dear member emailed the clergy after the General Conference passed the Traditional Plan. She asked, "What do we do now to stay true to our beliefs and to ease the pain caused to our brothers and sisters in Christ?" I think that is the question on many hearts.

My first response is to say that we continue to live beyond the ink. We remember who we are. We are the unique children of God whose faith is grounded in Jesus Christ; who live in hope and expectation for the coming Reign of God; we seek to love one another as Christ has loved us with mercy, grace, compassion and forgiveness; and we continue in our mission: With hearts full of love the mission of Washington Street UMC is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world from the heart of the city throughout the world.

On March 11th at 6:30 PM, our congregation will come together to receive a report on the action of The General Conference. What I hope is that I can provide the final version of the Traditional Plan that passed. Then we will break into small groups so that we can share in Holy Conferencing, love one another, encourage one another, and learn from one another. Until then, please know that your pastors are available to speak with you about this and all matters of faith. I love who we are and where we are in this journey of faith: We are Washington Street - we live beyond the ink! *In God's grace and love,*

Getting to Know Bob Peeler

Bob Peeler believes that the classmates on his hall at Clemson would have thought that he was the least likely person to become lieutenant governor of South Carolina and a member of the Clemson Board of Trustees. But over the course of his life, he became both.

Bob sings bass in the Washington Street Sanctuary Choir. He was initially drawn to the church because of the music he heard when he attended Jim Hodges' inaugural prayer service here in 1999, before Hodges' inauguration as governor and Bob's swearing-in for a second term as lieutenant governor.

Bob joined our church in 2001. In 2002, he lost a race for governor in the GOP runoff against Mark Sanford, who subsequently was elected governor.

After losing the gubernatorial bid, Bob joined the choir. He has a strong emotional connection to music, he said.

"I'll tear up listening to a Vince Gill song on the radio," he said. "The Majesty and Glory of Your name," a choir anthem, "I can't get through it."

Bob grew up in Gaffney. His grandfather was a dairy farmer and his father started Peelers Dairy, which bought raw milk from dairy farmers in upstate South Carolina, western North Carolina and northeastern Georgia.

Peelers Dairy bottled whole, low-fat and skim milk, chocolate milk and buttermilk.

"I was 15 before I knew you could eat something sweet without a glass of milk," Bob said. "I drink milk every day."

During the 1980s, Bob and his fraternal twin Bill did television commercials for Peelers Dairy, which were an imitation of the Bartles & Jaymes wine cooler ads, where Bartles does all the talking and Jaymes doesn't say a word. In the Peelers ads, Bob was the talking brother.

In 1986, when his daughter Caroline started kindergarten, Bob ran for the Cherokee County school board and won. After serving for four-and-a-half years, the legislators in his judicial circuit appointed him to the state Board of Education.

In 1994, Bob was elected lieutenant governor, the first non-legislator elected since the 1950s. He ran on a platform of bringing common sense and business sense to state government. He also pledged to do away with the lieutenant governor's security detail.

One of his major proposals was to have the first ever independent performance audit of state government. Appointed chairman of the Independent Audit of State Government by Governor David Beasley, Bob could pick two people to work on the project. One of them was a freshman county councilman from Charleston, Tim Scott, now a U.S. senator.

A surprising thing the audit found was that the Department of Mental Health had purchased, but never used, "13 years of pantyhose," Bob said. "That was a symptom of the problem."

When Bob ran for governor, he used a 14-foot fiberglass cow that had belonged to Peelers Dairy, as an attention-getting device. The cow had its own schedule.

"Someone called and wanted the cow, but the cow was already booked," Bob said. "They said, 'Well, just send Bob.'

Bob married his second wife Donna on December 21, 2014. Pastor Bill Childs officiated at the wedding in the Washington Street chapel. Only the three of them were at the mid-afternoon ceremony. Bob calls Donna "my angel. In many ways she has been my rock."

Three years ago, they adopted Hunter, who is now 10 and calls Bob "Pappy."

Bob has been working for Waste Management for 12 years. As senior manager for community relations and government affairs in the South Atlantic Area, he works mainly with local governments.

In 2013, the General Assembly appointed Bob to the Clemson Board of Trustees, which approves the funding and policies for the university. He attends many of the school's athletic events.

When Clemson won the national championship in 2017, Bob took Hunter to the Clemson-Alabama game in Tampa. When the confetti rained down after the victory, he told his son, "Look, you'll always remember this."

Bob did not go to the national championship game in California this year because he had to swear in his older brother Harvey as Senate president the next day.

"But, when I swore him in, the Clemson flag was flying over the State House," he said.

Bob likes to play golf and read. He said one of the best books he's read is "The Measure of Our Success: A Letter to My Children and Yours" by Marian Wright Edelman, president and founder of the Children's Defense Fund.

Currently, Bob is reading "Top of the Hill: Dabo Swinny and Clemson's Rise to College Football Greatness" by Manie Robinson and Tajh Boyd.

"Even if you don't like football, you'll like that book," Bob said

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




