group of 11 kids participating in Confirmation classes this year! The group began meeting in early March for classes to help them better understand what it means to be a member of the church. We have learned about Baptism, Holy Communion, the nature and mission of the Church, and the history and theology of the Methodist Church.



On April 20th -22nd, ten of our confirmands and four adult chaperones journeyed to Lake Junaluska for the Confirmation Retreat. It was a beautiful weekend to enjoy God's creation in the amazing Blue Ridge Mountains. We were able to lift our eyes to the hills and be reminded of God's loving presence.



One of our Confirmands, Sam Schatz, said he enjoyed the retreat because "we were able to go more in depth and detail about some of the topics that we have been studying so far—like sin and death -- and that helped me to learn about some of these things more clearly."

In worship and workshops, we learned how to support the church and each other through our prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness. We learned new ways to pray. We were reminded of how important it is to be fully present with one another. We took time to discern our spiritual gifts and how to use them in the church. We discovered that in our service, there is witness; and in our witness, there is service. We also enjoyed creating our own stoles to remind us of our ministry and calling.

We also had amazing opportunities to grow together as a Confirmation group. We played some "get to know you" games and learned just how unique we all are. We walked up to the cross which overlooks Lake Junaluska and enjoyed the beauty of creation from there. We enjoyed fellowship in team building activities, hanging around the cabin, and travelling in the car together.

But here is my favorite story from the whole weekend:

While we were enjoying some free time, the kids were playing tag around our cabin property and one of our confirmands fell and hurt her leg. Every single one of the other kids stopped what they were doing and ran down to help her. Two kids helped her get up, one kid grabbed a walking stick to help her back up the hill, two kids ran back to the cabin to grab her some ice, a few kids helped by telling her how to prop her knee up to stop the pain, and a few kids cheered her on as she made her way back up the hill.

That is what it means to support one another with prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness. That is what it means to be a part of the body of Christ. That is what it means to be part of the family of God. That is what it means to be the Church. And for that, I am grateful.

Getting to Know Janet Cotter

Janet Cotter talks with enthusiasm about how the renovation of the Christ Chapel Courtyard unfolded.

The area between the education building and the Fellowship Hall had become overgrown, and something had to be done, but where would the money come from to pay for it?

Janet decided that the sale of bricks in honor or memory of someone could raise money for landscaping and other improvements. The bricks would sell for \$50, and contain the person's name. They would form a path around the courtyard.

The plan "came to me in the night," Janet said. She took the idea to senior minister Mike Alexander and to the trustees, and both said "go for it."

Janet chaired a committee that did the initial work, rather than hiring a designer and landscaper to do it. Members of the committee were Chip and Debbie Teague, Paul and Beverly McClanahan, Sarah Threatt, Tim Nance and the late Cornelia Freeman.

The group was given 10 miniature English boxwoods from Mount Vernon, the home of George Washington, and a cutting of Elaeagnus pungens from the garden of John Wesley's chapel in London. The committee replaced the wooden doors with glass doors and added an arbor at the door to the Fellowship Hall.

"We had the best time making ends meet," Janet said. "Church members would call and say, 'How much money do you need?" The group began working in September 1996, and the courtyard was dedicated on June 7, 1998. Today, Janet says:

"I love walking out there and seeing the names."

Janet joined Washington Street in 1957, after she married L. Arlen Cotter. She had been required to attend church when she was a student at Columbia College, and she chose Washington Street.

The day Arlen was born, his father enrolled him on the church's Cradle Roll, Janet said.

Janet met Arlen on a blind date. She almost didn't go, but it was a double date, and her friend convinced her to go. The two couples went out for supper, and then they went to Arlen's parents' house and played bridge.

After that, Janet and Arlen saw each other often, and they were engaged within six months.

They married in July in the Baptist church in Brunson, the small Hampton County town where Janet grew up.

"We invited everybody in town," she said. "We didn't want to leave anybody out."

The couple were married 53 years, until Arlen died in 2010.

Over the years, Janet has served the church in many capacities. She was president of the United Methodist Women in 2004 and 2005, a member of the Foundation Board twice and is now a member of the Board of Trustees.

And, Janet said, she worked as a "general factorum" on the Washington Street Bicentennial Committee – at the antique sale, in the tea room, and she even did a little bit of counted cross-stitch on the bicentennial quilt. Janet's cross-stitch is the Scripture in the lower right corner; she, Susan Cordoni and Mary Alice Kinnett did "... yea, we have a goodly heritage. Psalm 16:6."

Her work on the quilt was small, she said, adding, "I kept having to pull mine out."

Janet also chairs the Bereavement Committee, and one can tell the project is dear to her heart. She started the committee about 10 years ago.

The minute she or one of her committee members hear of a death in the Washington Street family – a member, a spouse or a child – they take a large shopping bag, filled with paper products, instant coffee, tea and Kleenex, to the home.

"We don't go in, we just hand it through the door," Janet said. The bags also contain phone numbers at the church and a registry to record gifts. The bags are tagged with a verse of Scripture and an inscription saying that it is from the congregation of Washington Street.

Janet and committee members, May and Marshall Ramsey, Ann Fishburne and Lynn Luce get together once a year to ==fill the bags, and each one keeps three or four at their home until time for delivery.

Janet has a daughter Jan Jenkins and a son Les Cotter Jr. Granddaughters include Cotter Jenkins, Caroline Cotter and Beth Cotter Thompson. Grandsons include Forrest Jenkins III and Les Cotter III.

Janet said she loves to arrange flowers and read historical novels.

"But my biggest hobby," she said, "is just being with people, hearing what people are doing and thinking."

THE ALDERSGATE CLASS: For the next 4 weeks, Elaine Moses will continue to lead this class in discussions on the Dennis Prager's book, *Happiness is a Serious Problem*.
