## Numbers With Neal

Welcome to 2019! I know that from a calendar point of view we are already in February, but from a Finance point of view, please bear with me as I am in catch up mode so that I can present to you two very important sets of information. Namely, and for both the Church and the FACE program, the 2018 Financial Results, and the recently Church Council approved 2019 Budget. Firstly, the following is a summary of Washington Street's finances for January to December 2018:

From the above noted chart, and as is customary, you will note that the Financial Summary is broken down into two areas: Church activities, excluding those pertaining to the FACE ministries; and, FACE ministry activities alone. The following is a short summary of each area:

#### **Church Activities**

For January to December 2018, total contributions and other revenues were \$897,200.72 versus the total budget of \$909,000, resulting in an unfavorable budget variance of \$11,799.28; however, Total Expenses were \$886,730.55 versus the same total budget amount, resulting in a favorable budget variance of \$22,269.45. Overall, the net amount of total contributions and other revenues and expenses resulted in the Church being able to report a modest Surplus amount of \$10,470.17 for 2018.

For the Church to be able to report a modest Surplus for 2018 is a tremendous achievement for everyone involved. It is a testament to how the Church leadership has been able to effectively manage overall spending, however, during the month of December alone, total contributions and other revenues for the Church were \$149,304.82. Of this total, \$144,000 was received from contributions alone. This level of giving for December is high relative to recent years, and is very much appreciated.

The Christmas season of giving was extremely generous for our Church, and on behalf of the entire Church leadership, I would like to offer a very sincere and grateful thank you to each of you, as treasured and faithful members, for your graciousness and generosity. May the blessings that you bestowed upon our Church be returned to you in divine fashion.

#### **FACE Activities**

For January to December 2018, the four (4) categories of FACE resulted in total spending of \$28,845.65 relative to a total budget of \$45,000. Thus, FACE related spending was \$16,154.35 below or favorable to budget. Each of the FACE leaders, along with their respective committees, continued their judicious spending throughout the year. For 2019, the amount of \$16,154.35 is now available to fund the FACE ministry activities.

Now, with 2018 behind us, I would like to bring you forward to 2019 and the Church and FACE Budget that was recently approved by Church Council.

The Church's portion of the Budget, \$931,206 versus \$914,000 for 2018, reflects a less than 2% overall increase. The level of Pledge Commitments to the Church is currently at \$525,628, as compared to 2018 Pledge Commitments of \$681,338. This is a significant decrease and, for budget purposes, requires a higher level of non-pledge contributions to allow the Church to meet its total expenses. For 2019, the required level of Non-Pledge Contributions is \$352,578 versus the 2018 budget amount of \$187,662.

For FACE, in 2019, there has been a slight change in the overall structure. In 2019, the category, Age Level Ministries, and it's related activities, has been reorganized and the activities divided up into other FACE areas. Thus, the "A" of FACE has been changed to Administrative to reflect the administrative committee structure that supports the overall FACE program. Also, Connections has been changed to Community Life, and Engaging New People has been changed to Engaging God's World.

For 2019, you can see the areas of Faith Formation, Community Life, and Engaging God's with allocated budgeted funds. The Administrative area did not require any budgeted funds given that this area is mainly comprised of the Church's committee structure. The total amount of 2019 allocated funds for FACE is \$30,000 versus a \$45,000 budget in 2018.

Now, and from a Finance point of view, with the presentation of the 2018 Actual Results and the 2019 Budget, you are up to date. I look forward to continuing my communication of the Church's financial results to each of you. On behalf of the Finance Committee, we wish you, and your families, many blessings for the upcoming year.

# Leila Jackson Making Communion Bread



When 10-year-old Leila Jackson makes loaves of Communion bread for Washington Streeters, she mixes water, sugar and yeast until it foams and then adds salt and oil. Next, she adds a mixture of whole-wheat and all-purpose bread flour, until the dough is the right consistency.

While she makes it, she usually feels more connected to Jesus and God, Leila said.

"It makes me feel good about myself because I am doing service for the church," she said.

Leila learned how to make the bread from Morah Pesha, one of her teachers at the Cutler Jewish Day School, where she is in the fifth grade. Leila bid to spend a day with Morah Pesha as part of a silent auction at the school.

Morah Pesha taught Leila and her friend CeCe how to make challah, the bread the Jews eat at Shabbat, the Jewish Sabbath, which begins on Friday, near sundown.

Challah is usually braided and often has an egg wash, but Leila makes her loaves round, with no eggs because the recipe is vegan.

Leila has been making the Communion bread since December. She wanted more connection to the church because she realized that other activities, especially her devotion to horses, were making it impossible to attend church every Sunday.

She and her sister Ava ride horses and care for them five days a week at McMillion Farms in Hopkins. They also travel to horse shows – some as far away as Ohio and Florida – on weekends.

When they don't take local horses because of the distance, they draw the name of a horse they have never seen and do their best to figure out how to ride it.

Ava became a horse owner within the past year. Leila doesn't have a horse yet, but she wishes she did.

"I think I might get one sooner (than age 13)," she said. "I don't know if I can go three years with my sister having a horse and I don't." Leila has picked out the horse she wants, one she rode in North Carolina and really likes.

He is dark brown with a black mane and tail and a white strip on his face. She made a charm of his face to put on a necklace that came with a charm of the mountains in North Carolina, where he lives.

Leila also has been in plays. In 2016, when the Washington Street youths wrote and performed "There's No Place Like Bethlehem," a mash-up play, Ava played Dorothy from "The Wizard of Oz," and Leila was her little dog Toto.

At Dreher High School, Leila also has played the "cute and little stuff." For example, at an audition for squirrels, the high school students refuse to try out, saying, "Get the little kids to do that."

But Leila doesn't limit her cooking to Communion bread. She's helped make lunches – sandwiches and cupcakes – for the Washington Street Soup Cellar. And when their Mom and Dad, Jennifer and Grant, are due a date night, but it's too late to make reservations at a fancy restaurant, Leila and Ava cook a meal, as fancy as they can – for instance, fancy tacos, potatoes and salad.

However, Leila's career aspirations don't include cooking, she said. She wants to be a lawyer and an activist so she can stand up for people and animals who can't stand up for themselves.

"I'm going to have a family, and baking for a family is enough," she said. But then on a whim, she added:

"I might have a little café in my neighborhood, but nothing too grand."
