STAND UP SUNDAY began as a remembrance of the killings that took place at Sandy Hook Elementary School on December 14, 2012. Since then, an annual vigil or parts or even the entire worship service speaks to violence and in particular gun violence. The Faith Coalition on Gun Violence (FCGV) is a local, volunteer, nonpartisan, multi-faith organization that encourages and facilitates faith-based organizations to take actions that reduce gun violence. Examples of such actions include education, reflection, prayer, dialogue, conflict resolution and advocacy. Local religious institutions do not formally affiliate with the FCGV, but collaborate with it to engage their members in reducing gun violence.

Did You Know? 2017 Gun Facts in the US

- 1. Mass shootings (4 or more people shot, regardless of total fatalities) 345 reported/verified mass shootings
- 2. Children and gun violence
 - a. 2017: 733 from ages 0-11 killed or injured by gunfire.
 - b. 2017: 3,228 from ages 12-17 killed or injured
 - c. FBI data: children killed are far more likely to die from guns held by family members and acquaintances than by strangers
- 3. Officer involved shootings: 2017—317 officers were shot or killed; 2,076 reported/verified officer involved incidents where the subject-suspect was shot or killed
- 4. 2017 Total # of gun incidents: 2,487 reported/verified home invasions; 2,024 reported/verified defensive use and 2,013 reported/verified unintentional shooting
- 5. Stolen guns
 - a. Gun theft is on the rise; a 68% increase since 2005: one estimate—380,000 guns stolen per year
 - b. 2016: more than 237,000 guns were reported stolen nationwide (many people do not report a stolen gun)
 - i. So many gun owners are not securing their guns and thus they are easy to steal
 - ii. 67% come from unlocked cars; cars and trucks are targeted more than homes
 - iii. Stolen guns are increasingly showing up at crime scenes: Officers seize an illegal gun off the street every 74 minutes
 - c. Less than 10% of stolen firearms are recovered
- 6. Ghost guns: a gun with no serial/registration numbers is modified by the addition of extra parts; these guns are unlicensed and unregistered; criminals can use it to get around government tracking/regulation
- 7. Gun purchase laws:
 - a. Federal law allows people to purchase guns from unlicensed gun dealers
 - b. 40% of all gun sales in the U.S. are made outside of the retail system and without background checks; there are 5,000 gun-shows annually.
 - c. Unlicensed "private" sellers are not required to conduct background checks or maintain records of purchasers.
- 8. Rate of daily homicides in U.S. is 36 excluding most suicides; the 36 die from gun homicides, unintentional shooting, or murder/suicides; declared a public health crisis by the American Medical Association
- 9. Racial disparity: Gun deaths per 100,000----34 black men & 4 black women to 16 white men and 4 white women.

Getting to Know Rick Frierson

When Rick Frierson joined Washington Street in 1993, he took seriously the pledge to faithfully participate in the church's ministries. Two years later, when music director, Arletta Raley, asked if he would play the piano for Sunday worship, he took on the volunteer job and has been doing it ever since.

"It was a pledge of service," Rick said, and it also gave him an outlet for his musical training. "And, I like the choir members. It's rewarding to be able to work with such talented people." Rick said that after he started playing the piano at Washington Street, it was the first time the organ and piano were played at the same time.

Rick is a lifelong Methodist, who grew up in Trinity United Methodist Church, a big, downtown church in Sumter.

Rick started playing the piano in the third grade and played as a teenager for the annual youth musical at Trinity. He also played for a Baptist church in Sumter while he was in college, in order to earn spending money.

Rick played the clarinet, too, and was chosen for the National High School Honors Band. That group played an all-classical concert in Chicago after a week of rehearsals.

Rick earned a Bachelor of Music degree in piano from the University of South Carolina. But he also took pre-med courses, so he could become a doctor.

"I realized in high school it was going to be hard making a living in music," he said.

At a six-week summer program, sponsored by the Governor's School, Rick observed an autopsy.

"I thought it was fascinating to see how they determined how someone died," he said.

In college, Rick had to attend summer school to earn all the credits he needed for both majors. "They didn't overlap very much," he said wryly.

Rick graduated from the USC School of Medicine. He completed a four-year residency in psychiatry and a one-year fellowship in forensic psychiatry at the William S. Hall Psychiatric Institute. Forensic psychiatry is a field that deals with the interface between psychiatry and the legal system.

Among the tasks undertaken by forensic psychiatrists are evaluating the mental health of people charged with a crime and testifying in court, evaluating doctors and nurses to see if they still meet the qualifications to practice, evaluating patients to see if they are eligible for disability insurance and serving as an expert witness in malpractice cases.

But, Rick said, he spends most of his time teaching. Following his medical training, he worked for the state Department of Mental Health as a forensic psychiatrist, and in 2004 he was hired by the USC School of Medicine where he holds an endowed professorship and is vice chair for education in the Department of Neuropsychiatry and Behavioral Science.

Rick also directs of the Forensic Psychiatry Fellowship, the one-year program he completed as a student.

"I have two trainees a year," Rick said. "I teach them everything – lectures and supervision. A lot of different things. It's a very broad specialty."

Rick recently finished co-editing a "Textbook of Forensic Psychiatry," published by the American Psychiatric Association. Forty-five authors wrote 33 chapters, including one Rick wrote on "Psychiatry and the Death Penalty."

In 2016, Rick received the Seymour Pollack Award for distinguished contributions in education in forensic psychiatry. The award was given by the American Academy of Psychiatry and the Law.

Rick likes to play tennis "when it's warm." In the past, he played league tennis, but now, he plays for fun.

"I don't want all the pressure of having to win every match," he said.

Rick has an older brother, Robert, who is an engineer, living in northeast Columbia. Susan Luthren, a member of Washington Street, is his significant other.

Asked to describe himself, Rick said he is hard-working, dedicated and has a sense of humor.

"I like to think I'm funny," he said. "Here, in the clinic, somebody says something that reminds me of a song, and I'll start singing it, and people start laughing."


