2017 South Carolina Annual Conference

The 2017 South Carolina Annual Conference was held in Greenville, South Carolina, during June 4 - 7 with the theme "A More Excellent Way: We Walk By Faith, Not By Sight." Approximately 2,000 United Methodists attended. The Washington Street delegation included clergy member, Rev. Patricia Parrish, and lay members, Deborah Rowe, Rick Rowe, Mike Broome, and Charlotte Broome. Clergy whose Charge Conferences are tied to Washington Street also attended. Alston Lippert, Washington Street's newly appointed Associate for Nurture and Discipleship Development, was authorized to serve as a licensed local pastor during the Order for the Examination and Licensing of Local Pastors; Washington Streeter Dr. Sara Wilcox was featured in a video promoting the Faith, Activity, and Nutrition (FAN) Program at the University of South Carolina; and former Washington Street Senior Pastor, C. J. Lupo, was remembered during the Memorial Service. Lainey Wood, Washington Street's Communication Specialist, made beautiful and insightful remarks on behalf of Washington Street and Columbia College during the presentation from the SCUM Colleges and University.

In addition to Bishop Holston's excellent sermons during Conference, delegates heard presentations by Louisiana Resident Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey and Florence District Superintendent Rev. John W. Hipp. Bible Study was provided each day by Dr. Albert D. Mosley, President of Gammon Theological Seminary.

Conference celebrated a variety of United Methodist-led missions: disaster response, homes for the homeless, and bikes for people in need.

S.C. clergy and laity voted on five amendments to the constitution of The United Methodist Church (included on the SCUMC.org website), but results of the vote will not be released until all conferences throughout the denomination have voted.

All Conference reports (Conference Homes; Conference Colleges, Universities, and Wesley Fellowships; Archives and History; the Advocate; UMM, UMW; Lake Junaluska; Theological Seminaries; other committees and boards; etc.) can be found on the SC Conference website (www.umcsc.org). Reports initiating the greatest amount of discussion included the following:

- -The Report of the Council on Finance and Administration proposed a budget of \$16.95 million, a 1 % (\$169,223.) increase over the previous year and a budget that continues the council's target goal of at or around 15 percent of the cumulative average of all the churches' net funds. The proposal was approved.
- -The Report of the Board of Pension and Health Benefits proposed new health plans through the HealthFlex Exchange for active clergy and lay employees. The proposal was approved.
- -The Report of the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals, which included six resolutions that passed: Resolution to Oppose Human Trafficking and Help End Suicide and Homelessness among LGBTQ Youth; Healing from the Legacy of Lynching; Resolution Against a Muslim Ban; Resolution Supporting, Recognizing and Honoring the Services of Law Enforcement Officers; Resolution: A Formal Apology from Trinity UMC to Centenary UMC; and Welcoming the Migrant in our Midst. One resolution, Resolution Against the Dakota Access Pipeline, in Solidarity with Standing Rock, failed. One resolution, Resolution for the Realignment of the South Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church, was declared out of order by the Bishop. This resolution suggested the disaffiliation of the SC Annual Conference from the United Methodist General Conference.
- -The Report of the Secretary of the Cabinet, which included ten supported resolutions to discontinue churches: Cedar Creek UMC in Winnsboro, Bethel UMC in Anderson, Bethlehem UMC Anderson, Dunean UMC in Greenville, Startex UMC in Startex, Trinity UMC in Greenville, Bath UMC in Bath, Gassaway UMC in Saluda, Pleasant View UMC in Cowpens, and Timmonsville UMC in Timmonsville.

The Conference closed with the Sending Forth service where the "Fixing of the Appointments" was established. Rev. Patricia Parrish was appointed to Washington Street United Methodist Church as Senior Pastor for 2017-2018. Rev. Joe Wilson was appointed Associate for Community Connection and Mission, and Rev. Alston Lippert was appointed Associate for Nurture and Discipleship Development.

In January of this year, Church Council met over a weekend-long retreat in Threatt Hall where a new organizational structure for our church leadership network was introduced, called F.A.C.E. The church's long-standing leadership network (Church Council) consists of various committees, chairs of committees, our Annual Conference Representatives, clergy and staff. The F.A.C.E. structure itself consists of four main components; Faith Formation, Age-Level and Family Ministries, Connections and Engaging New People. Within each component are specific committees and teams that aid in the collaboration of said component. Reverend Parrish refers to F.A.C.E. as, "the methodology to implement Renewal 2020." Renewal 2020 was a long-term vision initiated by our congregation and led by several teams of creation and implementation. By pulling all areas of our church life into one organizational system, F.A.C.E. is set to integrate with the previously formed Renewal 2020 Plan in an effort to enhance the organization and increase the fruitfulness of our efforts.

The building of F.A.C.E. began by aligning the Renewal 2020 Officers with the currently appointed committee chairs for all needs of the church. For example, Beth Matthews chaired the Faith Formation piece of Renewal 2020, and now she chairs the "F" piece of F.A.C.E., that encompasses all committees related to the Faith Formation effort. The desire for creating such a structure arose when the potential conflict was foreseen by our leadership that committees outside of the Renewal 2020 initiatives could be working on the same project or mission as one of the Renewal 2020 initiatives and not know it. It also guides the answers of questions such as, "Who should lead this effort?" F.A.C.E. simply organizes our programs and ministries to integrate all areas of our church life into Renewal 2020. F.A.C.E. doesn't take the place of any piece of Renewal 2020 or alter our church governance, nor does it collide with the plans set for the next few years. Rather, it encourages collaboration amongst all areas of our church to propel the mission of Renewal 2020 into the future.

Just as every member of the congregation was incorporated in the Renewal 2020 vision process, we encourage everyone to plug into the F.A.C.E. structure as well. There can never be too many ideas, too much creativity or enough collaboration. If you feel called or led to join an area of F.A.C.E., we are waiting for you! The Nominations and Leadership Development Team appoints chairs of committees each year, as well as suggests members who they think would fit well, but it doesn't stop there as committees are never full. If you are looking to join a specific committee, or if you're simply not sure where you'd like to engage but you know you'd like to be a part of the process, please let Revered Parrish know.

With the integration of F.A.C.E. and Renewal 2020, our leadership is now looking even further ahead into the future. They ask themselves in terms of building upon Renewal 2020, "What's next?" all the while continuing with the initiative set in place for the upcoming years. Reverend Parrish states, "What we do in our ministry is how we want to present ourselves." With Renewal 2020 and F.A.C.E., our ministries are our future, and our future starts now!

The Faith, Activity, and Nutrition (FAN) program was developed with churches in SC to heart disease and diabetes by helping members to become more physically active and to eat a better diet.

FAN encourages church members not only to make healthier lifestyle choices, but to also create church environments that support healthy behaviors. We will include low fat recipes, healthy alternatives to certain foods, exercise tips, etc. in future issues of The Connection.

This month's recipe is the healthier alternative of a favorite church pot luck dish - Green Bean Casserole. The most commonly used recipe has 320 calories, 23 g of fat, and 1068 mg of Sodium. The ingredients in the alternative recipe only have 87 1/2 calories, 5 g. of fat and 260 mg of sodium.

1 lb. Frozen green beans 1 can 98% fat free cream of mushroom soup Half of a large onion 1/2 Tbsp butter

1/2 cup of skim milk

1/4 cup of Parmesan cheese

1/8 tsp. Black pepper

1/8 tsp ground thyme

16 reduced fat Ritz Crackers

Try using the alternative ingredients - your heart will thank you.
