When our children and grandchildren outgrow their clothes, most of us are able to buy replacements. But so many families in the Midlands can't afford to do that. A lot of our neighbors rely on the Clothing Bank at the Cooperative Ministry, where they are given good used clothing that has been donated.

What the Clothing Bank is always short of, though, is new underwear. That's the point of our Undie Sundays, sponsored by the Active Faith Small Group. We want to provide new underwear for children who otherwise might not have any. All sizes are needed; remember that most teenagers wear adult sizes. The Clothing Bank at the Cooperative Ministry is the largest in South Carolina, and donated items are always given to those in need, not sold in a thrift shop. Teachers and guidance counselors come in seeking school clothes or coats for students who would otherwise have to stay at home. Social workers are frequent visitors, picking up things for their neediest clients. Families whose homes have burned or flooded are served here, as are mothers and fathers looking for work clothes to get or keep a job. Help the Cooperative Ministry help our neighbors!

### Getting to Know Alisa Liggett

In retrospect, it seems like Alisa Liggett's path was a clear one to the job she really wanted, executive director of student conduct and academic integrity at the University of South Carolina.

Her journey started at the University of South Florida-Tampa, near the suburban home where she grew up. Because she, her twin sister and their mother were in school at the same time, they had to work their way through. She lived at home for two years.

When she was a junior, Alisa became student body vice president, a paid position. This allowed her to move away from home and also to learn how a college worked.

Alisa decided to earn a master's degree in higher education administration from Florida State University. She had an assistantship in student conduct and found that she loved it.

It involves talking to students who have hit some sort of crisis, getting them to open up really fast about something they're not proud of and then figuring out how to help them.

When Alisa got her degree, she applied for a job at only one school, USC. Her field is specialized, and having thought Tallahassee was cold, compared to Tampa, she didn't want to go much farther north than Columbia.

She gave it one shot, and she got the job. She supervises a staff of 12, who she says "do most of the work." The cases fall into three categories.

First, academic integrity (about 550 cases a year): cheating on tests and buying papers off the Internet. "As technology gets more complex, ways to cheat get more complex," she said. Students have faked not only doctor's excuses, but also a funeral programs from a grandparent's "funeral."

Second, general conduct (3,000 to 4,000 cases a year): bringing a weapon on campus, distributing drugs and hazing.

Alisa said hazing is "like an infection that spreads and spreads until the people don't realize it is a controlling and dangerous activity." She said that three fraternities have been suspended for hazing this year.

"There are so many frightening outcomes that it keeps you up at night," she said.

The third category is "students of concern" who require a behavioral intervention (550 to 600 cases a year). Alisa is chairperson of the behavioral intervention team.

For example, a student can call and say she thinks her roommate is suicidal. Someone from Alisa's office will call and ask the roommate, "Do you realize this is what people are seeing happen?"

Someone from her office will call and attempt to help, which in many cases results in connecting the student with the campus counseling center.

Alisa said two situations are the most difficult: suspending someone and assessing someone who has been victimized.

She said something that happened while she was in college was life-changing. She volunteered with a group called Kids on the Block, which used puppets to identify and combat child abuse. A third-grade girl disclosed to Alisa's puppet – and to her whole class – that she was being abused. Alisa's puppet talked to the little girl about what she should do, and after that, Alisa knew she had to do something similar to change people's lives.

"I wish I could thank her for setting my course," she said.

Alisa was raised Catholic and attended Catholic schools. One Palm Sunday, her boyfriend Pete Liggett suggested that she attend Washington Street because of the beautiful service. Pete, a psychologist, had to work that day. He had started coming to Washington Street when his first wife Tiffeny was director of the Child Development Center.

Alisa walked into the sanctuary by herself. The Rev. Mike Alexander, the senior minister, was preaching. Alisa sat next to Martha Helen Sawyer (now King). By and Bobby Collins were sitting in front of her, and they were so friendly that she returned.

"I knew more people in this church in a few weeks than I ever knew in my beloved Catholic church," Alisa said.

Alisa and Pete got married at Washington Street in 2007. Her fraternal twin Angela – "my favorite person on earth" – was one of her Best Women.

Today, Alisa serves as a communion steward and on the Good Samaritan Committee, which considers monetary requests from members who have unexpected expenses. Alisa calls herself the "hard-core person" on that committee.

"Because of the job I do, I want someone to be working toward their development," she said of the recipients. "It's supposed to be for a single crisis."

Alisa has two step-children, twins Scott and Chloe, who are seniors at Clemson.

She teaches two yoga classes a week, one at USC's Strom Thurmond Wellness and Fitness Center and the other a private class on Arsenal Hill.

"It's a true joy to help people stop their busy day and reconnect with what centers them," she said
