Getting to Know the Rev. Becky Shirley

he Rev. Becky Shirley's path – from a public affairs degree from Columbia College in 1984 to full ordination as a United Methodist elder in 2008 – was not straight.

Along the way, she made a number of detours – a semester of law school, an MBA, jobs at the American Heart Association, and the United Way of the Midlands.

But her heart kept getting pulled toward the helping professions.

"God was saying, 'You really need to be in the people-helping business," Becky said.

A turning point came in 1995, when Becky, who had been working as the part-time volunteer coordinator at Trenholm Road UMC in Columbia, took a two-week training course to become a leader of the Stephen Ministry at that church. The Stephen Ministry trains lay caregivers to meet weekly, one-on-one with care receivers, people experiencing life difficulties. The program's motto is, "Christ caring for people through people."

Through her work with the Stephen Ministry, Becky received an internal sense that God was calling her to pursue ordination. Members of the congregation and the two ministers she worked with – the Rev. Regi Thackston and the Rev. John Holler – affirmed what she was sensing and encouraged her to attend seminary.

Becky was a part-time student at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary for 10 years, taking one or two courses a semester, while she continued to work at Trenholm Road.

In 2006, she was granted a license to preach, and the bishop appointed her to the Johnston/Harmony charge in Edgefield County.

Appointments at Platt Springs UMC in West Columbia and Philadelphia UMC in Fort Mill followed. Now Becky has come to Washington Street. She said she and her husband Richard are excited about the appointment and are looking forward to meeting and working with the people of WSUMC.

"It is an honor to be appointed to such a prestigious and welcoming congregation," she said.

Becky grew up in Columbia where she and her two sisters worked in their parents' household goods moving-and-storage company. They had a lot of business from Fort Jackson, and all three of the girls did billing and stenciled the client's name on the outside of their shipping crate with black ink, it was messy. Becky said the job laid the groundwork for a strong work ethic.

The family was lifelong Methodists, and as they moved around the city, her parents would pick a neighborhood church. Brookland UMC in West Columbia, College Place, Asbury Memorial, Virginia Wingard.

When Becky was in college, she and her family transferred to Trenholm Road, which had an active College and Career Sunday school class.

Becky met her husband Richard at the Columbia Christian Singles Dance,



held at Eastminster Presbyterian Church. He doesn't dance, but he came to meet people, she said. He walked across the room and complimented her on her earrings, saying they look like the ones worn by the main character in "Flashdance." She said she hadn't seen "Flashdance" or any of the other movies he mentioned.

Becky invited everyone at the dance to come to her Sunday school class the next day when she would be teaching. Richard was the only person from the dance who came. However, he brought two friends with him.

In church, he wrote on his bulletin: "I'm going to a movie this afternoon. Would you like to go?"

They married five years later, in December 1988, at Trenholm Road. Music from a favorite movie, "Somewhere in Time," the time-travel romance starring Christopher Reeve, was part of the ceremony. The music was Rachmaninoff's "Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini."

Becky and Richard had been married less than a year when they adopted their daughter Michelle from foster care. Michelle was almost 5, and her biological father was Becky's cousin.

Becky then began working at Trenholm Road, and Michelle was

accepted into the 4-year-old room at the church's preschool. They went to the church together almost every day. When Becky visited the homebound, she took Michelle with her, and Michelle would give one of her drawings to the person they were visiting.

Becky said the most meaningful thing about ministry to her is "being able to see the way the Spirit works in people's lives."

The pandemic has given churches "the opportunity for a fresh start," Becky said. Church membership in mainline churches has been decreasing, so "we weren't effectively making disciples of Christ before the pandemic."

"What really does make disciples of Christ? A lot of it is relationships. What we've learned through the pandemic is that relationships are really what make disciples of Christ. It's time for good creativity. It's almost like the very beginning of the church."

Becky uses drama to help people hear a story that they've heard a thousand times differently. She has portrayed the woman at the well, Mary Magdalene, the innkeeper's wife, and the woman at the tomb, among others.

At Becky's last church, members of the congregation did a slow read of Acts.

"It's an opportunity to spend the first 15 minutes of your day with God," she said. "A lot of people go to church, but they don't really read the Bible." She gave the participants a list of readings, and they sent her comments and questions which she posted on Instagram. The use of social media was an attempt to attract younger people, she said, adding, "You have to allow the Holy Spirit to touch people's lives, and not preach to people."


Becky and Richard bought a house in Spring Valley. Her father died when she was in college, but her mother, Ann Joyner, is 90 and lives with them.

Michelle and her husband, Joseph Graham, live in Forest Acres and are expecting a baby in October. Both teach at Fairfield Central High School; she teaches English and he teaches science.

Richard is retired from his business, Laser Experience, where he sold home movie projection systems. He also was a tennis instructor, but he has stopped doing that, as well.

But more than 35 years after that Sunday-afternoon first date, Becky and Richard are still watching movies. They have a movie room over the garage that seats six. Its screen is 110 inches wide.




