About the Service

Recognizing that if we do not acknowledge the sins of racism in our past and present, individually and systemically, we cannot hope to understand and heal the wounds of

racist comments and actions. The service will include elements of confession and repentance and the repudiation of the times when this church has been silent in the face of racial injustice.

Social distancing is still encouraged. Masks are optional.

"When the RJAT was formed, one of our plans was to hold a Service of Repentance and Forgiveness," says RJAT Coordinator, Nancy Whittle. "The purpose is to repent of the sin of racism, white privilege and our participation in it, seek forgiveness, and to recognize the need for healing for those who suffer from racism. WSUMC is thankful to partner with Journey Church in this effort and look forward to continued opportunities to dialogue and build relationships that can lead to transformation."

onations to Washington Street's 2021 Living Gift Market were donated to the Future of Food project in Ecuador. Our members donated a total of \$1,983.65.



Heifer International's Future of Food project aims to close the living income gap for 100,000 rural Ecuadorian families through sustainable agricultural systems. This project accelerates innovation and access to investments for farmerowned agribusinesses that create high social, economic, and environmental value. Future of Food improves nutrition and increases incomes for 18,000 small-scale farming families in the Pichincha, Azuay, and Galapagos Provinces by 2025.

The Future of Food project responds to current demand for healthy food that is produced in an environmentally sustainable and socially friendly manner. Project activities include agro-ecological trainings on irrigation, organic fertilizer and pest control, and organic certification processes. The project applies research to innovate and adapt production and harvesting practices so farmers can efficiently respond to market demand. Their goal is to raise \$3.7 million between 2020 and 2025 reaching 18,000 families.
