A Book for its Time

few weeks ago the WSUMC archives received a gift of an important book entitled *Southern White Ministers* and the Civil Rights Movement authored by Dr. Elaine Lechtreck. The book is published by the University Press of Mississippi and might be a book of interest to Washington Streeters.

Some years back our church historian at the time, Dr. Bob Beamer, had loaned Dr. Lechtreck an audiotape copy of a sermon by Rev. Dr. Claude Evans delivered at Washington Street Church in July of 1996. Evans felt strongly about issues of racial justice during his time as associate minister at our church in the early 1940s. His poignant sermon of July 19, 1942, regarding racial equality had even created dissension in our church and had resulted in the decision to bar Evans from further pulpit appearances. Well into retirement, Dr. Evans was invited by WSUMC to preach again more than 50 years following his controversial sermon. His message resulted this time in a standing ovation from the congregation. The 1996 sermon is the one on audiotape and returned to our archives. It is indeed gratifying to read this 1942 story regarding Dr. Evans included in Dr. Lechtreck's scholarly work on the Civil Rights Movement.

Perhaps the best way to introduce this book is to quote from a dust jacket summary:

[Southern White Ministers and the Civil Rights Movement] is a revelation, documenting

with unusual thoroughness the white southern ministers who risked church careers,

family stability, and personal safety to witness for racial justice in the years of the civil

rights movement. [Lechtreck] is a gifted storyteller who places her accounts of these


ministers within the troubling context of the time for such progressive figures who made

moral stands—whether modest or bold—that one way or another pushed the South toward needed change.

Anyone wishing to read Lechtreck's book from the archives should contact Mike Broome at (803) 783-4265. Broome will be glad to meet you at the church to check out the book to you. Since the archives presently has only one copy, the check-out period will be limited to two weeks.

Dr. Lechtreck has graciously agreed to make her book available to Washington Streeters for purchase at her author's discount. The paperback version regularly sells



for \$30.00, but members of our congregation can acquire it for \$20.00. WSUMC will have a limited number of books available for your purchase in three weeks or so. You may leave your check for \$20.00 made payable to WSUMC in Robbie Douglas's box in the church office or mail your check to the church and mark the envelope to Robbie's attention. Please indicate "Civil Rights Book" on the memo line of your check. You might rather designate a \$20.00 donation to WSUMC through the REALM online system. Please ensure that we know that this donation is intended to reimburse the church for Dr. Lechtreck's book. We'll wait for approximately two weeks beyond this issue of *The Connection* before we send in the book order. When the books are available, we'll so inform those who have provided payment. You may obtain your copy at the church, or you may ask that a copy be mailed to you.

Elrod will also serve as secretary of the Cabinet. She was born in Columbia, South Carolina, and graduated from Columbia College in 1995 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. Rev. Elrod has served as senior pastor of Clemson UMC in Clemson, SC since 2018. Rev. Dr. Jamieson has served the Columbia District as superintendent since 2014.
