Wear Orange on Sunday, June 5!

he country has been devastated by the recent mass shootings in Uvalde, TX; Buffalo, NY; and Laguna Woods, CA. We continue to pray for victims and families. The Racial Justice Action Team is sharing an opportunity for those who want to take action on the issue of gun violence this weekend.

About Wear Orange

#WearOrange for my daughter's future On January 21, 2013, Hadiya Pendleton marched in President Obama's second inaugural parade. One week later, Hadiya was shot and killed on a playground in

Chicago. Soon after this tragedy, Hadiya's friends commemorated her life by wearing orange, the color hunters wear in the woods to protect themselves and others. Wear Orange is now observed every June. Thousands of people wear the color orange to honor Hadiya. More than 40,000 people are killed with guns, and approximately 85,000 are shot and wounded every year. Orange has become the defining color of the gun violence prevention movement.

South Carolina and Gun Violence

GUN SUICIDES AND SUICIDE ATTEMPTS

Every year, an average of 529 people in South Carolina die from gun suicides, and 50 are wounded by gun suicide attempts—a rate of 9.8 suicides and 1.0 suicide attempts per 100,000 people. South Carolina has the 26th highest rate of gun suicides and gun suicide attempts in the US.

GUN HOMICIDES AND ASSAULTS

Every year, an average of 410 people in South Carolina die by gun homicides, and 744 are wounded by gun assaults-a

rate of 8.6 homicides and 14.8 assaults per 100,000 people. South Carolina has the 10th highest rate of gun homicides and gun assaults in the US. In South Carolina, 81% of all homicides involve a gun, compared to 76% nationwide.

CHILDREN AND TEENS' GUN DEATHS

Guns are the leading cause of death among children and teens in South Carolina. In South Carolina, an average of 92 children and teens die by guns every year, of which 31% of these deaths are suicides and 59% are homicides. In the US, 35% of all gun deaths among children and teens are suicides and 60% are homicides.

INTIMATE PARTNER HOMICIDES

In 2019, 26 women were fatally shot by an intimate partner in South Carolina. 81% of female intimate partner homicide victims were killed with a gun, compared to 67% nationwide.



Other individuals on the team were Susan Brown, Jean DeWitt, Mary Anne DeWitt, Barbara Graves, Dottie Hanlin, Licia Jackson, and

Ed McClain. These cookbooks are still available after several printings and are only \$20. It is double-bound and is over 400 pages! You can purchase one in the Church Office.

As our date for our first luncheon together since the outbreak of Covid-19 approaches, I thought it would be fun to randomly select a recipe from the cookbook to include in this issue of *The Connection*. I don't know many who don't like a good potato salad, so here is a recipe for potato salad from longtime member Kelly Epting that sounds wonderful.

Not only will you find some great recipes, but wonderful stories and images from days gone by. — Jane Peterson

Creamy Roasted Potato Salad

3 pounds small red potatoes, cut into eighths
2 onions, cut into fourths
6 garlic cloves
1/4 cup olive oil
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup sour cream
1/4 cup lemon juice
3 tablespoons chives, chopped
1/4 cup parsley, chopped
2 tablespoons capers, drained
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper

Roast potatoes: Combine potatoes, onion, garlic and oil; tossing to coat with oil. Place in a jellyroll pan. Bake at 400°, stirring once for 30-40 minutes or until tender and browned. Drain and cool.

Toss salad: Combine mayonnaise and remaining ingredients in a large serving bowl. Add potato mixture, tossing gently to coat. Serve warm or cover and chill. Serves 6.
