Salkehatchie

Susan Caskey reported on the Salkehatchie trip:

"Salkehatchie Summer Service is not just a job, it's an adventure. For over 45 years, youth (ages 14 and older) and adults have been serving families in South Carolina with home repairs and other forms of assistance. Salkehatchie volunteers do not help others, they serve others through the power and love of God. Since the onset of COVID two years ago, all Salkehatchie camps have been closed, but this summer, 11 camps were open. The Washington Street team attended the Bishopville camp where they served three families. Much needed repairs were made to floors, walls, and roofs just to name a few. We are so proud of the youth and adults who worked very hard to make a better place for those living in poverty conditions. Thanks be to God!"

Ecuador

Mackin Wall, who helped coordinate the mission trip along with her father, Tom Wall, reported on the team's mission.

"The WSUMC Ecuador Mission Team, in partnership with the Evangelical Methodist Church of Ecuador, traveled to Quito, Pastocalle, Pijal, El Prado, Atacucho, and Otavalo to serve our sisters and brothers in Christ. Areas of service



included a medical clinic and pharmacy, testing for and handing out reading glasses, Vacation Bible School for the children of the communities, and home visits. The youth group began their own ministry of feeding every stray dog in each community we traveled to. The team also took part in different workshops for the church and community leaders about boundaries, self care, spirituality, drug and alcohol abuse, and community therapy. We were joined by new and old friends in Ecuador who served alongside us in every area. We built friendships that will last a lifetime through service, worship, and fellowship."

Committee/Team Highlights

• The Records & History Committee last met on Saturday, July 23, 2022, in the archives. The committee's efforts to reprint copies of Dr. Huff's *Tried by Fire* and Maxine Sullivan's The Church on the Corner of Washington and Marion Streets is encountering problems. The committee recommended that Mike Broome contact Jessica Brodie at the Methodist *Advocate* office to ask for her assistance. The committee is also requesting typing assistance regarding the membership card digitizing project. This project is moving along well under the leadership of Lynn Shirley. The committee also approved a recommendation to name the WSUMC archives in honor of a longterm church historian. A proposal will first go to the Trustees and, if blessed by this group, will move on to Church Council for final approval. Trustee chair Dr. Pete Liggett has been contacted regarding the allocation of an additional room for museum expansion. The process of arranging interviews of several Washington Streeters of long standing was discussed. This process should begin formally in mid-September.

- The Ad Hoc Sign Committee of the Trustees is working towards completion of the bidding process for a new sign at the Bull St. corner. For more information, contact Jane at jane@ wsmethodist.org.
- Sunday Dinner Ministry received notification of a \$5000 grant from Richland County to support their efforts with the homeless community in 2022 and 2023. The team, partnering with the Soup Cellar team, has met and are planning three events in 2022. A Saturday breakfast event is planned in both August and December plus a weekday lunchtime event is planned for October. Publix has just notified the team that they will be sponsoring the purchase of fried chicken (\$200 gift card donation) for our guests at the October lunch. - *SPPRC* has been busy this summer and is looking ahead at a busy fall calendar too. This summer a staff survey

was conducted to evaluate and ensure the assignments, responsibilities, skills, and talents of our staff are aligned with the church's strategic plan. This survey had the goals to increase employee satisfaction, ensure strategic goals are in focus, and to know what changes or additions to staff are possibly required. This fall in September and October, the SPPRC will review and present the 2023 staff budget. The team also will meet in November/December to complete and supply district required reports and forms.


