

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Getting to Know Bill Westerkam

hen Bill Westerkam completed his third year at Johns Hopkins University, he changed his major from chemical engineering to pre-med. He knew he wanted a people-oriented profession.

Bill grew up in the Baltimore area. When he was 14, his parents divorced. His 17-year-old sister went with his mother, and he lived with his father. He never saw his mother or his sister again.

"My mother divorced me and my father," he said. Today, "I don't know whether my sister is alive."

Neither of Bill's parents graduated from high school. He described the family as dysfunctional. Bill's father died before he went to Hopkins, and he went to live with an aunt.

When Bill was still living with his family, he raised rabbits and ducks.

"I was very fond of animals, so I thought I was going to be a vet," he said. He became a pediatrician.

"I transferred from animals to kids. Neither can talk to you, so they're similar."

Bill earned his medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania in 1966. While he was in medical school, he married Diana, then an English teacher, and they had two sons.

The birth of their first son influenced Bill's choice of a specialty.

"Danny was just a delightful miracle," he said. Randy was born a year and a half later.

Bill did his pediatric residency in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and he served as a pediatrician in the Army for two years at Fort Bragg, N.C.

The Westerkams moved to Florence, S.C., in 1971, and Bill joined an established pediatric practice there.

In 1977, when they were to move to Columbia for Bill to become Director of Maternal and Child Health at the state Department of Health and Environmental Control, the DHEC director said Bill needed to get a master's degree in public health and that DHEC would pay for it.

So Bill enrolled at Harvard University, and the family moved to Boston. It was during this time that Diana started seminary at Boston University. Their kids were older, and Diana arranged her classes while they were in school.

"We didn't want anybody to raise them except her," Bill said. "That's why they turned out so well."

Following three years at DHEC, Bill set up a solo pediatric practice on Harbison Boulevard where he bought into a new building. He remained there until he retired in 2011.

Meanwhile, Diana graduated from Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in 1982. In 1984 she was ordained as an elder in the South Carolina Methodist Conference.

Her first appointment was in Laurens where she had a parsonage. She and Bill lived apart during the four years she was there.

"Most of the time we got together on Saturday, and I went to Diana's church (Central United Methodist) on Sunday," Bill said.

Diana's next appointment was in Blythewood where she had two churches, Oak Grove and Beulah, for four years. Diana came to Washington Street in 1992 and served as the associate pastor here for 18 years.

Asked what one experience or person has influenced him the most, Bill replied:

"I'm sure it's Diana. She helps me very much spiritually. She's my best encourager. No one else comes close to being my best friend."

The most meaningful thing about Washington Street for Bill are the relationships in the Grace Sunday school class. "My best friends in the church come from the Grace class," he said.

The Westerkams live in Irmo. Danny is a doctor in rehab medicine at Encompass Health Rehabilitation Hospital of Columbia, formerly HealthSouth of Columbia. Randy is a doctor at the Brain and Spine Institute at Lexington Medical Center.

Danny and Randy visit their parents frequently to talk about what is going on in their lives.

Diana and Bill have six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren on the way.

Bill subscribes to medical newsletters and other medical publications and



spends part of each day reading them. He also reads spiritual literature each day; his current book is *The Secret Message of Jesus: Uncovering the Truth that Could Change Everything* by Brian D. McLaren.

Bill also has an exercise regimen – lots of walking, working out with weights, flower gardening and maintaining five bird feeders. He and Diana also take care of Randy's 8-month-old Boykin Spaniel puppy, who Bill describes as "so bright."

Bill and Diana watch "PBS NewsHour" every night, as well as "The Situation Room with Wolf Blitzer." Just this year, they started following the Atlanta Braves baseball team. "We know all the players," Bill said.

SPPRC Announces New Staff Position Director of Congregational & Volunteer Engagement

The SPPRC joins Rev. Becky in recognizing the importance, reach and depth of the work of current staff as they strive together to fulfill God's vision of making disciples of Christ and keeping the vision of WSUMC in the forefront of everything we do as a congregation. In a spirit of thankfulness, we want to take this opportunity to publicly thank our current staff (business, facility, music, and ministerial) for their passion, flexibility, and commitment to lead us in equipping the members of this congregation to continually be a mission-focused, informational, and nurturing community of faith through the power of the Holy Spirit within Columbia and beyond. They have done a phenomenal job of helping us navigate the many changes that the pandemic brought to our corporate life and our community over the last 2+ years.

As we began to emerge from the lingering pandemic this past year, the members of the SPPRC realized that some of the ways we "do" church started to look different during the pandemic, and we recognized that the way we engage in ministry is going to continue to evolve as we move forward into the future. So, we began to talk with Rev. Becky about the need to evaluate our current staffing paradigm in order to engage more readily and effectively in the new opportunities that the pandemic has brought into our lives but to also consider the new opportunities, that we are not yet tapping into, that the changes in technology afford us.

We asked questions like: what are our core values? Our mission and vision? Where is God leading WSUMC in this "post COVID" world? What staff roles do we need to fulfill the church's mission and vision? At the same time, we asked our current full-time staff to share with us what they spend the most time doing in their current position, what they wish they had more time to do, what they love and what frustrates them about their jobs.

That was an important step in our process because we currently have a very gifted and dedicated staff. We want to build upon our staff members' strengths and capabilities and allow them to be faithful stewards of their time and talent. The SPPRC also must be mindful of the charge to be faithful stewards of the church's staffing dollars. In addition, we want to ensure that we provide effective staffing to support new and needed programming in alignment with WSUMC's mission of making disciples of Christ. This discernment process led us to determine the need for a new staff position in order to:

#1-Give more direct attention and support to developing and growing an effective small group ministry system that will re-engage persons who have become inactive as well as engage guests who join us, whether in person, via our livestream services of worship, or interacting with our social media content.



AND

#2-Develop, oversee, and shepherd a process for engaging persons who are new to this community of faith in ways that help them explore and grow in their faith journey.

A job description for this new position was prepared by SPPRC, reviewed by both the Finance Committee and the Church Council in their May meetings, and unanimously approved adding this new position. The new position title is Director of Congregational & Volunteer Engagement. It is important to note: this new position does not affect the bottom line of the current year's church budget.

A search team was formed made up of SPPRC, staff, and lay member representation. The search process was conducted over June and July. We received 12 applicants, after reviewing the applications, we conducted preliminary interviews with 5 of the applicants and narrowed our search to three for in-person interviews. I am pleased to announce that the search team unanimously selected and the SPPRC approved one of these candidates, Christine Taylor, who started September 1. She will be formally be introduced to the congregation this Sunday. There are plans to set up several meet-and-greet times for you to get to know her and for her to get to know this congregation.
