Getting to Know—Christine Taylor

hristine Taylor says her new job at Washington Street is an adventure that will evolve as she works with members of the congregation to discern where our church should go next.

A fourth-year student at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, Christine said she was attracted to the position—Director of Congregational & Volunteer Engagement—because she "really liked the idea of doing new things."

On the job since September 1, Christine sees her role as fostering opportunities for relationships and empowering lay leaders in the congregation. She has been attending most group meetings, including Sunday school classes, to get a feel for what is going on and to meet people.

She also has been working on a catalog of Sunday school materials, such as DVDs, so classes can see what resources the church already has.

Last year, Christine was the vicar, or intern, at Mt. Tabor Lutheran Church in West Columbia.

She grew up in Davenport, IA, one of the Quad Cities of Iowa and Illinois. Her mother is an elementary math teacher, and her father is a psychology professor at Augustana College, a Lutheran school in Rock Island, IL. An older brother is a data analyst for General Mills in Minneapolis, and her younger sister is a student at Augustana College.

Christine graduated from Augustana College with a degree in religion and a minor in political science. At first, her major was undeclared, but when she was required to take a religion class, she really liked it. "It kinda clicked," she said.

She, her classmates, and their professor traveled as a group and spent a trimester in East Asia—Japan, Taiwan, Hong Kong, and Mainland China. They also spent a trimester at Holden Village, a year-round Lutheran retreat center in the wilderness of Washington state.

Christine worked for three summers during college at the Sky Ranch Lutheran Camp, west of Fort Collins, CO. It was an experience that influenced her more than any other.

"It was a chance to live and work and worship in community," she said. "It was the first place where I regularly preached and led Bible studies." The camp held a worship service every day for whoever was there – little kids, teens, parents, and staff.

The camp also allowed Christine to include her love of the outdoors. She led hikes, took campers white-water rafting on the Poudre River, and encouraged them as they experienced a ropes course.

During her senior year in college, Christine began to consider going to seminary. She felt called to "lead and love God's people." And, she had the support of her church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

She felt like she needed to experience something far from home.

"I was young, unmarried, and needed to go on an adventure," she said. She visited the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, and she "felt like it is a community that would take care of me far from home."

Christine met her future husband Isaac on the first day of seminary as they moved into neighboring apartments. He also was a first-year student so they were in the same classes. Incidentally, Alston Lippert, who would become an associate pastor at Washington Street, was their classmate.

Christine and Isaac started dating right away, and in October 2021, they



married on a farm outside of Knoxville, TN, where he is from. This year, Isaac is the vicar at St. David Lutheran Church, located just off U.S. Highway 1, between West Columbia and

Lexington. After graduation, he hopes to become a chaplain in

the U.S. Army.

The Army's Chaplain School is located at Fort Jackson, and the process to become an Army chaplain requires three years of congregational work.

"We don't know if we'll get to stay (in Columbia) or if we'll be sent elsewhere," Christine said.

Christine loves to hike and be outdoors. She loves to read and she reads many genres – historical fiction, suspenseful mysteries and memoirs. A recent book is *All Who are Weary: Easing the Burden on the Walk with Mental Illness* by Emmy Kegler.

Asked about a typical day at Washington Street, Christine notes that she spends most of her time brainstorming with staff and congregants about things they would like to plan and then planning those things.

"I don't know that I've had a 'typical day' since I started here," she said. "That is good. Every day is something new."


Pride Festival Weekend

WSUMC Sends Letter to The Methodist Advocate

his week, a letter was sent from several WSUMC members to The Methodist Advocate in regards to WSUMC' stance on Social Justice and Equality for all. Elegantly crafted by Cindy Wilcox, we are sharing the contents of this letter with our congregation:

A letter from Washington Street UMC

Washington Street UMC Stands for Social Justice & Equality for All

If you have attended Washington Street United Methodist Church (WSUMC), you have seen this statement on the front of its bulletin:

The congregation of Washington Street UMC praises and serves God from the heart of the city in ways that reach our neighbors near and far. We welcome and affirm all who seek the love and mercy of Christ regardless of race, creed, age, gender, national origin, sexual orientation, gender identity, or economic status. We honor traditions as rooted in our history, our expression of worship, and our respect for theological curiosity. We nonetheless see vital change and ongoing renewal as essential for spiritual growth.

WSUMC has a long history of social justice activism. This focus on social justice has included feeding its neighbors in its soup cellar. Many church partners have helped us serve our neighbors over the years.

More recently, as part of its Engaging God's World Team, WSUMC has taken intentional steps to expand from that mission and to respond to current events.

Following the Methodist Church General Conference vote to continue its discriminatory treatment of LGBTQIA+ individuals, WSUMC completed a church-wide discernment process which resulted in a unanimous vote by the church council to join the Reconciling Ministry Network which is committed to achieving full inclusion for LGBTQIA+ individuals in the church. The Reconciling Next Team was formed and has implemented a number of initiatives, including church participation in Pride Weekend, conducting an LGBTQIA+ intergenerational dialogue (with 3 other churches), offering a Service of Repentance and Healing for LGBTQIA+ people on October 13 along with the creation of SAFE Space (an affirming gathering place during the Sunday School hour, and co-hosting Friday Unwind (an online social gathering) with Reformation Lutheran Church.

Following the murder of George Floyd, the Racial Justice Action Team was formed and undertook a discernment process to educate its members on the many facets of racial injustice and the sin of white supremacy. This team has implemented a number of initiatives including a comprehensive library of resources, bias training, book group discussions, voter registration, church participation in Walk for Life to reduce gun violence, and co-hosting (with Journey UMC) a Service of Repentance and Healing acknowledging the sins of racism.

As part of sharing this work with the community, WSUMC placed banners on its Bull Street fence. These banners have shown our beliefs that Black Lives Matter, that All Are Welcome in the church, and that we should work to Reduce Gun violence. If you drive down Bull Street, you may have seen these banners but more likely you have not. Sadly all of these

banners have been cut down and stolen. WSUMC is currently considering new, more secure, options for banner placement. However, whether we have a banner or not, we want the community to know that all are welcome and that our work is not deterred.

Join us as we continue to work toward full inclusion in the church, razial justice, and service to our community.


