Getting to Know—Nicholas Todd Shumate

icholas Todd Shumate arrives at Chapin High School between 7:00 and 7:30 am each morning. The choral director's first class is at 8:25 am, and he teaches until 3:45, with a 30-minute break for lunch. He typically has an after-school rehearsal on Monday or Thursday from 7 until 9 p.m., after sports and band practices are held.

Nicholas teaches five different choirs:

The Chamber Singers, for 11th- and 12th-graders, require an audition.

HiLights Show Choir, for grades 10 through 12, also requires an audition. All numbers are choreographed.

A male choir, Singers, for grades 9 through 12.

Concert Choir for 10th- through 12th-grade females.

Chorus for ninth-grade females.

Although he was the adult choir director at St. Andrews Lutheran Church in Columbia, in 2021, Nicholas "was looking for a new challenge" and he applied to be music director at Washington Street.

"Oftentimes in careers, you need something new to reinvigorate you," he said. "I wanted to be able to do different types of repertoire that we can do here at Washington Street."

He started the job here in March of last year.

"It was a very interesting start to a job," he said. The church broadcast prerecorded services and held an occasional outdoor service. Nicholas met with the church's paid soloists to hear them sing and then planned music the best he could for the voices and service locations he had.

Because of COVID, he still hasn't met many of the choir members, he said.

Nicholas grew up in Rock Hill, the youngest of four boys. He first became heavily involved in music at Northwestern High School in Rock Hill. The high school choir was the best in the state, he said.

"We sang things in high school that most people don't get to do in their lifetime," he said. In 10th grade, the choir sang the Christmas portion of Handel's Messiah, with the soloists coming from the high school.

Nicholas said he decided he wanted to be a music educator and conductor his sophomore year in high school, although he briefly considered law school after watching the CBS series "JAG" and fantasizing about becoming a military lawyer.

Nicholas graduated from Limestone College with a bachelor's degree in music education. He went straight to graduate school at Winthrop University in order to gain more experience and confidence in rehearsing choirs. At Limestone, he only had 60 days of teaching; at Winthrop he conducted undergraduate students daily.

"You can read a lot of books about teaching and directing choirs, but the only good way to learn how to teach is to be in front of students," he said.

When Nicholas applied for the job at Chapin High, he had never heard of the town of Chapin. But two undergraduate students at Winthrop were Chapin alumni, and one of them told him the choral director's job was opening.

That was nine years ago. This year he's also teaching a theater class. Plans are to offer two productions, including a musical next spring.

"We're figuring it out as we go along," he said. "Years ago Chapin had a really strong theater program. The hope is to rebuild the program so that a full-time theater director can be hired."

Because none of the Chapin schools have a performance space that's acoustically suitable, the schools hold their concerts at Chapin Presbyterian Church for a week in December and then again in May.



With the help of parents

and students, they clear the entire "stage" in the sanctuary on Sunday night, leaving only the piano. They bring in risers and lift them onto the stage.

On Monday night, the high school choirs have their dress rehearsal. Tuesday evening, the middle school choirs perform. Thursday the intermediate choir, made up of 5th- and 6th-graders, performs, and Friday night, the high school choirs perform.

Saturday morning at 10:00 am, they "strike the stage," leaving everything as it was the previous Sunday.

Nicholas enjoys playing tennis and golf when he can. He took up tennis in middle school and played on the men's tennis team at Limestone.

Nicholas likes hanging out with friends. Two of his closest, local friends are Sarah High, choral director at Swansea High School and director of music at Salem UMC, and Craig Coelho, choral director at Gilbert High School and director of music at Cayce UMC.

A self-professed "foodie," Nicholas likes to try new restaurants. Favorites include Colas Restaurant, Arabesque on Devine and Tazza Kitchen Trenholm Plaza.

He said he likes to laugh and often listens to comedy radio on Pandora while driving.

Nicholas is Midlands site coordinator and a committee chair for the S.C. Region Choir. He also is coordinator of the High School Honor Choir for the S.C. American Choral Directors Association. Both are volunteer jobs, but Nicholas said he does the work because without choral directors pitching in, these events for students wouldn't exist.

Washington Streeters have been welcoming and kind, Nicholas said.

"Everyone has gone out of their way to help me," he said, mentioning especially Harvey and Ann Jessup whose daughter Hannah was an undergraduate student in the choral program at Winthrop when he was a graduate student.


Online Discussion
