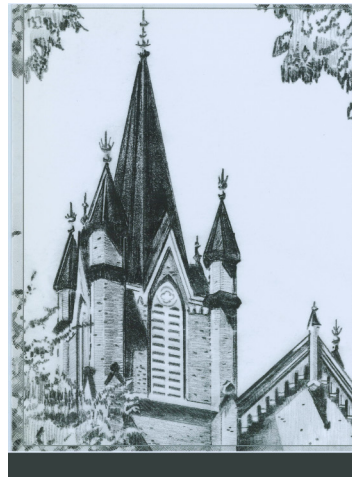

Getting to Know ... Christine Hait

Community is important to Christine Hait. She reflects on the community at Columbia College, where she retired last year after 29 years of teaching English.

She found a new community in the League of Women Voters when she joined last year and agreed to be director of voter participation during a busy election year.

And she thinks the most meaningful thing about Washington Street is its community.

“Being part of a church that is open and inclusive just gives me a positive feeling,” Christine said, adding that when she is at church she feels a sense of belonging.

Christine is the stewardship chair, a member of the Grace class where she sometimes teaches, and a member of the Raggio Report committee and records and history committee, where she has been involved in developing the church’s museum on the third floor.

“The more involved I have become, the more my faith has grown,” she said.

Christine was born in Texas City, Texas, across the bay from Galveston. Her dad was a chemical engineer, and when she was 12, the family moved to San Marino, California, for a year. When they moved back to Texas, they settled in Alvin, which is south of Houston.

Christine’s dad had graduated from Texas A&M University, and she had a sister there, so it was only natural that she would go there, too. Christine earned a bachelor’s and a master’s degree in English from A&M.

Christine became involved in film programming and was president of the Aggie Cinema her senior year.

After Christine earned her master’s in 1983, she went to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill to work on her Ph.D. As a teaching assistant at UNC, Christine taught freshman composition and an introductory film criticism course.

After she was hired by Columbia College in 1992, in addition to teaching literature and first-year writing, Christine taught an honors seminar on Paris in film and literature. Over the years, she led two trips to Paris with honors students.

For several years, Christine has been a member of a committee, consisting of Columbia College and University of South Carolina faculty, which produces The Tournées French Film Festival, each year.

The festival has ordinarily been held in November, but during COVID, it was held online and it will return to in-person viewing next spring. Funded by a grant from the French consulate, it will consist of one film a week for six weeks. It is open to the public, and information will be available from the French department at USC closer to the time of the festival.

Christine met her husband Stephen Hait in Chapel Hill. She was newly divorced and living with roommates. One

of those roommates introduced Christine to Steve who was one of the roommate’s colleagues.

They married in 1993 at Peachtree Rock State Park in Lexington County in a small ceremony, with their parents present.

Christine describes Steve, a retired computer consultant, as “a wonderful person, sociable, interesting, and someone who loves to learn.” Over the years, Steve has played many musical instruments and for several years now has been taking ukulele lessons, she said.

In 2002, the couple adopted Ana Sofia from Guatemala when she was only 4 months old. Today Ana Sofia is a junior at USC, majoring in English with an art history minor.

Ana Sofia came to them with her name, and “we thought it was a most beautiful name,” Christine said. Ana Sofia has fond memories of her years as a member of Mary’s Maidens at Washington Street.

Christine’s literary specialty is American modernist women writers. The modernist period represented a radical break from Victorian tradition and focused on the years between the two world wars.

Christine wrote her dissertation on Katherine Anne Porter, the Texas author who wrote the novel “Ship of Fools” and many highly acclaimed short stories. In her dissertation, Christine argued that the key to appreciating Porter’s artistry is understanding the intersection between gender and creativity in her fiction.

In addition to writing about Porter, Christine has published a number of articles on the work of American modernist author Kay Boyle.

Christine said a big influence in her life has been her experience at Columbia College.

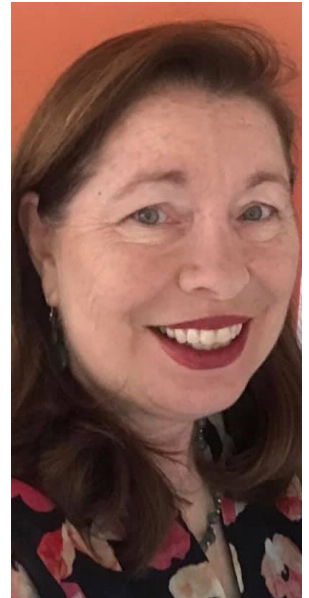
“All the people I worked with and learned from,” she continued. “Being able to have my career within a community that is still important to me today, that shaped me into the person I am today.”

Christine said that many of her friends now are people she worked with at the college, and social media gives her an ongoing connection with former students.

As stewardship chair at Washington Street, Christine said she learned how important it is for people to think about all the ways they give – their time, their talents, their treasure,

“It’s so easy to look around Washington Street and see all the ways people are doing that,” she said.

Christine said she hopes people will look through the



volunteer opportunities listed in the Ministry Menu 2023 pamphlet sent in the mail as part of the stewardship campaign.

"We might start doing some new things here because we find someone who can do them," she said.

Between her work with the church and the League of Women Voters, Christine has been busy this fall. During the month before the election, she staffed two or three events for the league each week.

"My husband thinks it has become my new job," she quipped.

In addition to reading and watching "tons of films," Christine likes to have lunch with her daughter and take walks around her Hollywood-Rose Hill neighborhood.

"I'm never bored because there's always someone to be with, a good book to read, or a movie to watch," she said.
