Cash donations are always greatly appreciated.

The team will also be handing out coats, gloves, socks, jackets, and blankets, as well as hygiene items, so please remember to bring in your donations no later than Dec. 2. Please drop them off in the designated area in our Mission Garden in the back hallway.

Volunteers are needed for cooking/prepping, greeting, serving, plating, and clean up. 






Stewardship Bible Study Studies Three Simple Rules: A Wesleyan Way of Living

or the past 3 weeks, small groups have gathered every Wednesday to discuss the idea that God calls us to be good stewards in God's world. A group of 7 individuals met Wednesday mornings on-site at the church with Christine Taylor and Robbie Douglas, and 6 individuals met with Christine on Wednesday evenings



through Zoom. Together, the groups walked through the Rueben P. Job's Three Simple Rules: A Wesleyan Way of Living and the Epistle of James.

The first week, the groups spent time learning about the history of stewardship in the Bible, practices that have been kept for thousands of years by God's people. While they learned, the on-site group shared coffee and donuts, while they helped prepare the WSUMC mailer envelopes which would disperse the Ministry Menu and pledge cards. Robbie Douglas commented, "I enjoyed getting to know the other classmates even better than I knew them before. It gave me a deeper and better perspective on the material by hearing everyone else's thoughts."

The second week, these small groups dove into some hard self-reflection. Job's book isn't hard to understand, but it is certainly hard to put into action. This author calls Christians to a radical and countercultural way of living. This week, the group answered the following questions: How have I been doing good? How have I been doing harm? What gifts has God entrusted to me? What are my goals for growth? Group members shared aloud as they felt comfortable, some chose to journal their answers instead.

Robbie noted, "I have worked with and 'lived' Stewardship for many years, if not all of my life, but I have never really studied or thought very much about how or if I routinely practice living out my faith. I've certainly never thought of it in terms of the Three Simple Rules. I try to live those 'rules' but never really understood how they related to Stewardship. I felt like this study would give me a different perspective and hopefully a deeper understanding and it did."

The third week, the group discussed spiritual practices. In order to be sustained, we Christians must attend to our own spiritual needs; we need to create space for God to fill our

Advent Small Groups Starting Soon



iggles could be heard throughout the church on Friday, November 14, as children gathered for Parents' Night Out. 11 kids and 1 baby attended this round of PNO programming, which gives our WSUMC parents a night to go on a date, attend to a hobby, or order takeout and watch that movie they've been waiting for. One of the moms commented this round that she was using the time to work on a sewing project!

This month's Parents' Night Out programming centered around thankfulness. Kids were greeted by Rev. Becky, and then fed dinner that was provided by Vickie and Lisa Voegeli, Mary Lide, and Susan Brown. As kids ate their mac & cheese, chicken tenders, and fruit, they told adult volunteers about their school-day learning. When they finished dinner, cards were colored for some homebound members at WSUMC. Kids then gathered around for a Bible story with Christine Taylor, to learn about Mary and Elizabeth singing the *Magnificat*, two women who sing to God because they are thankful.

The 11 boys and girls were then separated into two groups, which rotated between a craft and a game station. At the craft station, they cut out pictures from magazines, pasting them on construction paper to make a "Thankful Collage" with Eleanore Langley, Beth Mathews, and Shelley Stafford in the 1st and 2nd-grade classroom. Many of the kids' crafts included pictures of pets, houses, food, warm coats, and even a couple of cut-outs of Santa Claus. Eleanore commented, "I really enjoyed reconnecting with children that I used to help teach when they were 2 and 3 years old. It's wonderful to see how our young people are growing up and to meet new friends."

At the games station, kids played Thanksgiving Bingo with Ann and Harvey Jessup, competing for prizes of small toys and temporary tattoos in the 3rd and 4th-grade classroom. The game had pictures of Thanksgiving-related items in each square, and our Bingo-caller named items like "Dinner plate! Cornucopia! Pumpkin pie!" When Harvey called out, "Corn!" the girls surprised us, and all started singing a silly song that they knew about corn. Ann said, "Learning silly songs from





the children and watching them lovingly cheer one another along in games," was her favorite part of the evening.

After rotating through these stations, groups reconvened with Christine to hear The Berenstain Bears' Thanksgiving Blessings by Jan Berenstain in another Sunday School classroom. Each kid got a copy of the story to take home at the night's end. Ann noted, "[Parents' Night Out] is a great way to get to know WSUMC's children better and support our young families. The children are full of energy and sunshine and they give us hope for the future of the church." After this night with kids, centered around thankfulness, we at WSUMC are especially thankful for our wonderful volunteers who make this ministry possible!


Dr. Anthony Hodge has written a practical book that anyone can work through to help anyone evolve into a better version of one's self.
