Getting to KnowBeth Robinson

• Cake, her food of choice. "My family is no longer in charge of getting my birthday cake," she said. "I get it because I want it done right." It's usually Funfetti from the Silver Spoon

Bake Shop on Devine Street.

• Her job at Epworth Children's Home, where she uses her go-get-'em attitude to match what individuals can give with Epworth's needs – whether that is \$1 million or two bikes. Washington Streeters participate in the Christmas at Epworth program when they draw items from a Christmas tree and then bring gifts to the church, or have them delivered through Amazon. Each year, Washington Street provides more than 150 gifts.

Beth grew up in Windsor United Methodist Church in her Columbia Northeast neighborhood. In 2016, she joined Washington Street along with her family – her parents, her sister, and her husband. She is the daughter of Susan Caskey and the late Sam Caskey. Her sister Emily is five years older

than she is. Her husband is Marshall Robinson.

Beth's father died five days after the family became members. As a new member, she was impressed with the amount of support they received from the congregation, Beth said, adding, today, her father would be "so ecstatic" to be a part of Washington Street.

Beth said she had a wonderful childhood. It seemed like her mother was always on the road, taking Emily to ride horses,

and her to various dance classes around town.

Sometimes the activities lasted late into the night, but her parents were always intentional about the family having dinner together no matter how late it was.

When Beth was a freshman in high school, she attended the University North Carolina School of the Arts in Winston-Salem, where she could continue her classical dance training. After a year, she returned home.

"I decided to just enjoy dance again," she said. She took non-competitive dance classes and became a cheerleader at

Richland Northeast High School.

After high school, Beth attended Lander University in Greenwood, where she majored in business marketing and management. She graduated in 2009. Beth and Marshall met at Lander when they were getting sorority and fraternity pictures taken on "bid day."

"I was standing on the steps (when I saw him)," Beth said. "I pointed, and I said, 'Who is that?' He had very curly red hair

that was a little unkempt."

She asked her roommate if she should send Marshall a friend request on Facebook. Her roommate said she should. She had another friend give him her cell phone number. In 2006, they started dating, and they married on November 23, 2013, at Windsor UMC.

Today, Marshall works for the budget office at the

University of South Carolina.

In 2020, Beth and Marshall had their son, Lathan. "Our one and only, unless God provides otherwise." Lathan was

born a month before the COVID-19 lockdown went into effect. He was the first person baptized at Washington Street during the pandemic. The baptism was attended by family and two ministers, Alston Lippert, and senior minister Patricia J. Parrish. Lathan is the middle name of Beth's father, and Lathan's middle name Reed is Marshall's middle name.

Because of the pandemic, 2023 was the first year Lathan had a birthday party,

and Beth discovered he has her fondness for cake. Now, before he attends a party, he asks his mom, "Will there be cake?"

Beth and Marshall are raising Lathan with the philosophy found in the children's book "Pete the Cat Saves Christmas."

Beth graduated from Lander during a recession, and she worked retail until she heard about the job at Epworth.

"I'm kind of embarrassed because I didn't know where Epworth is," she said. She went to work there in 2010, and the job soon became a ministry.

No two days are the same. A woman really did drive up and hand Beth a check for \$1 million. Another woman, who lives in California, was a law student in Columbia, and she sends a

gift through Amazon each Christmas.

Beth loves spending time with her family and introducing Lathan to all things. A typical Saturday may consist of a trip to Riverbanks Zoo, a corndog lunch at Henry's, and a walk around the neighborhood with Lathan's "big brother" Hampton, their blue pit bull.

Whenever there is time to rest, Beth enjoys a good television series and putting some time into her new hobby, needlepoint. She said she welcomes any needlepoint advice.

Beth and Marshall take advantage of Susan's hospitality every Wednesday when following her time volunteering in the church office, she picks Lathan up from the Washington Street Child Development Center. This allows Beth and Marshall to grab dinner with the understanding that they will pick Lathan up before Susan's Bible study.

"Marshall and I are beyond thankful for the love and understanding of everyone at WSUMC," Beth said. "We hope to raise Lathan with a respect for our place of worship, but find comfort that he loves coming to church each week. The entire

Robinson family takes pride in our church home."

Aside from Salkehatchie, Beth has been involved in other youth activities. She worked part-time as a youth leader at Windsor UMC from 2012 through 2015. She and Marshall have taught the youth Sunday school class at Washington Street and she said she is happy to help with other youth activities. Now, she and Susan teach the youth class one Sunday a month or whenever Sarah-Kate Gravely, the director of children & family ministries, needs them. She and Marshall attend the new Sunday school class taught by Christine Taylor.

Beth is excited about being the assistant director at Salkehatchie this year. She, her mom, and Marshall will travel to Beaufort County about once a month until the camp starts in June. The camp is about more than learning to put on a roof, install a trill a tri

install a toilet, or replace rotten flooring, she said.

"I love that so many strangers volunteer their time to come together with a singular purpose of assisting a community in need," she said, "and that so many bonds and friendships are made."





Sunday School Updates
