On April 28th and 29th, Active Faith held a Drive n' Drop for the Richland County Foster Care program. With the help of local news anchor, Dawndy Mercer Plank from WIS, the committee collected hundreds of items for the cause. Diapers, wipes, socks, and so much more were collected from the community as well as WS members.

On April 30th, the Racial Justice Action Team hosted a very successful Columbia SC: 63 Civil Rights Walking Tour in downtown Columbia. Over 35 individuals took part in the hour-long walk from the State House to Boyd Plaza in front of the SC Art Museum on Main Street. The tour was led by the Columbia SC: 63 group based out of the University of South Carolina.

Then, on Saturday, May 6, Active Faith sponsored Stringtime Duo, a fundraiser concert for the people of Ukraine. Over 100 individuals joined us in Christ Chapel for an amazing concert featuring Ukranian musician



Marina Alexandra, and Russian domra player, Angelina Reed. With delightful banter, and very skilled musicianship, the perforners delighted the audience with a number of rousing classical guitar pieces during the evening. Along with sponsors, and the money raised during the evening, the team raised over \$5,000 for the people of Ukraine. The money will be distributed between Charlotte for Ukraine, and UMCOR.

Getting to Know...The Rev. Alston Lippert

he first time Alston Lippert went on the Walk to Emmaus, a three-day retreat intended to renew and strengthen one's faith, she thought she heard God call her to go into the ministry, but she ignored it.

A couple of years later, in 2013, while leading Companions in Christ, a small group on spiritual formation, Alston heard the call more distinctly and discussed it with her pastor.

When Alston met with the district superintendent to discuss her candidacy for ministry, she started backpedaling on her commitment. She talked about ways she would do ministry without becoming a pastor. And that is what she did at her home church, Northeast UMC. She volunteered with youth and children. She chaired church committees. She taught Sunday school and led small group studies. She visited the sick and the homebound. And more.

The next time Alston went on the Walk to Emmaus — in 2016 — she was on the organizing team. Once again she heard God telling her very clearly, "you need to go into the ministry." She realized it was three years, almost to the day, since she heard the call the first time.

This time, her reaction was different. She met with the district superintendent and began the process for ordination into the United Methodist Church. She attended a candidate's retreat and enrolled in the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary.

Alston said she didn't want to wake up in three more years and hear the call again.

"From that point on, the doors swung open," Alston said. "Every time I might pull back, there would be something that would let me know I was in the right place, doing what God wanted me to do." That knowing gave her peace and contentment, she said.

Alston has been at Washington Street since 2017. She is the associate pastor for nurture and disciple development.

Alston is a lifelong Methodist who grew up in Union, S.C. She was named Nora Alston after her mother and her grandmother. Over the years, she has known a handful of people named Alston. Half were men, and half were women, she said.

When Alston left Union, she went to the College of Charleston. She planned to major in accounting, but after her first economics course, she changed her major to economics. She loved economics in high school, and she found that economic principles, such as the laws of supply and demand, made sense to her.

Following graduation from college in 1986, she attended the University of South Carolina to pursue a doctorate in economics, which she earned in 1990. She became a teaching assistant and taught summer school beginning in 1987.

Her goal was to teach economics at the college level.

"I had some great teachers who formed me," Alston said. "I taught off and on for 30 years."

Alston met her husband at USC. He was pursuing a doctorate in finance, and they were on the same floor in the



business school. They married in 1993 and had two children 18 months apart: Alston Lee and Catherine.

Their separation in 2005 "rocked my world," Alston said.

She said the divorce, which was final in 2006, was the catalyst for her faith journey, which led to her ministry.

"I had the curse of feeling I was fairly self-sufficient, that I didn't need God," Alston said.

She signed up for a Disciple Bible study course, and her relationship with the Lord flourished. She went on the Walk to Emmaus.

One of her fellow pilgrims on the walk mentioned a small group Bible study, Companions in Christ, which has helped groups open to God's presence and guidance. Alston gathered a group of 10 people at her church and led the study.

One of Alston's areas of responsibility at Washington Street is disciple development, which is achieved through small group studies.

Another part of her job is staying in touch with the sick and homebound.

"I get to love on people who generally are going through difficult times, and I appreciate God using me in that way," Alston said.

Both her parents had long illnesses before they died, so Alston knows from experience how important it is to have someone to accompany you through the hard times. Preferably that someone can help you realize that God is with you, she said, adding, "I try to be that person."

When her former mother-in-law Charlotte was hospitalized last year, and her former husband rushed to her bedside in Cincinnati, Alston called him and offered to pray on the phone. When the family gathered, they asked her to pray with them all, again by phone. When Charlotte died, the siblings said they wanted Alston to do her memorial service.

Charlotte had divorced in the 1970s, during a time when the church tended not to be as accepting of divorce as it is now.

"She was a faithful person, but she didn't have a relationship with the pastor," Alston said. "Whoever would have done the service would not have known her."

Alston talked to her several times a year and sent pictures of

her children.

"She was a really special woman," Alston said. "Her life and her faith needed to be celebrated."

Alston Lee, Alston's older child, is working on a doctorate in plant biology at the University of Florida. She came out as non-binary about two-and-a-half years ago and uses the pronouns they/them. Catherine is working on a master's degree in earth and environmental resource management from USC. She and her husband Josh married last June.

Alston is a huge fan of Gamecock women's basketball. In 2022, she went to the NCAA Final Four in Minneapolis and watched the Gamecock women win the national championship.

She also likes to hike and has hiked the completed parts of the Palmetto Trail with a friend. The two have hiked about 400 miles of the trail which will be 500 miles long when it is completed. It will stretch from Walhalla in the Blue Ridge

Mountains to Awendaw on the Intracoastal Waterway.

This week, Alston has been on a six-day, 75-mile pilgrimage through Spain from Tui to the cathedral at Santiago de Campostela, a shrine to St. James, the apostle, who is believed to be buried beneath it. Her journey is the last leg of the Camino Portugués, or the Portuguese Way, which begins in Lisbon.

Although she went alone, Alston has been on a tour with seven other women, whom she had never met. The day after they complete their walk, they are scheduled to attend a Pilgrim Mass at the cathedral.

"For me it's about time to unplug and leave behind worldly distractions to see what quiet and solitude bring," Alston said several days before she left for Europe. She said she wanted to see what God had in store for her on the pilgrimage and to figure out how to go deeper in her relationship with God.
