The 2023 US/Mexico Border Mission

arly in the morning of June 19, our WSUMC US/Mexico Border Mission Team gathered at Catholic Charities Respite Center in McAllen, TX, a border town across from Reynosa, Mexico. We were at the center to assist immigrants and refugees at the border who were awaiting asylum hearings. It took only a few minutes before some of our team were engaged in a conversation with a family from Venezuela. The woman and man (Darimar and Franklin) and two young children



travel bags of food for the immigrants' onward journey, doing activities with the children who had just been released from ICE custody, and helping in the kitchen. **Catholic Charities** Respite Center helps immigrants take that first big step to a new life in the USA. The center provides meals, food for the journey, a bed for the night, showers, a pharmacy, medical care, and clothing. Most importantly, it provides the cheer and encouragement of the workers and volunteers

were trying to make their way to Denver where their sponsor was located. They were in McAllen to wait for the next year or so (without permission to work) until their case could be heard. The story is much longer, but we were able to help them make a connection in Denver and provide them with resources to assure a stable beginning to their time in the USA. The reality is that this family does not have the odds or the courts in their favor. Most requests for asylum are turned down and the asylum seekers are required to return to their home country. This one encounter that became so personal summerized all the themes of Washington Street's mission trip to the Texas/ Mexico border— "service, learning, and solidarity."

The team, comprised of Pato Aravena, Mary Edmonds, John Evans, MJ Fox, Kay Ayers-Garren, Abby Kiesow, John Pannell, Mackin Wall, and Tom Wall, spent the rest of the day making

and important information about the next steps to take to be legally and safely moved through the country and the bureaucracy of US immigration. In McAllen, the temperature at times hit above 110 F. Due to even stricter penalties just announced by the Biden administration for illegal entry into the USA, it was relatively quiet. Often the center can see more than a thousand people a day, but there were less than 200 that day.

Mary Edmonds was particularly impacted by the time we spent at Catholic Charities. "The children and their parents at the Catholic Charities Humanitarian Respite Center touched my heart in a big way. Most had traveled many miles from countries in Central or South America to seek asylum. One young man I met said that he only spoke Creole and Spanish. He had come from Haiti by way of South America and had learned Spanish on the journey. All parents sacrifice for their children, but these parents have left their own countries and extended families, whom they may never see again, and made tough, probably dangerous journeys. I can only imagine the conditions that drove them to leave their homes. The families at the Respite Center have been allowed to enter the United States, but still face many challenges. They must appear before a court where a judge will decide if they will be allowed asylum. I only wish that politicians and others who rail against immigrants could see these families who deserve our admiration and respect."

"One highlight for me was gaining insight into the process for applying for asylum. All are children of God worthy of special intervention as best we can provide. Our team made a difference in the lives of at least one family," said MJ Fox.

John Pannell also remarked on his experience. "I normally don't like working with kids, but I enjoyed working with the kids at the Catholic Charities Respite Center," he said. "We colored and played ball with them—which afforded the parents time to complete paperwork or just relax. They were so sweet and full of joy despite being in such a dismal situation. It really gave me hope."

The time on the Texas side of the border, in McAllen, TX,

included information/learning sessions with several nonprofits, including Proyecta Azteca, an organization working to provide immigrants with affordable housing. We also made visits to several areas of the border wall. We were met at First UMC, McAllen by Willie Berman, a UM Missionary sponsored by the UMC Board of Global Missions. He and a co-worker from the mission, Fernando, drove us across the border to Rio Bravo where we would be based at Manos Juntas (Hands Together) ministry. Willie shared how he was called by God out of a business career to care for the people around Rio Bravo. Fernando and his wife, Consuella, had also experienced God's call to help those who were poor and had little advantage.

Our practical work over several days was to help prepare a large room that can be rented to the community for community and family functions. Painting and removing debris were the main tasks. The small charge for use of the

We also visited several other ministries including a school serving a poor community, a medical and dental clinic, and a daycare under construction that, when completed, will allow parents to freely work to earn a living income.

The faith and perseverance that we found among the people on both sides of the border were moving. We were inspired by immigrants who travel for months with small children in hopes of a new and better life, and we were inspired by Christians engaged in spiritual and social work to make communities in Mexico more habitable, thus reducing residents' need or desire to emigrate. In addition, our team from Washington Street enjoyed serving together. Indeed, Kay Ayers-Garren said that a highlight of the trip was getting to know the team members better.

VBS 2023 Was Stellar!



Reconciling Next's June Book Discussion

ast month, the Reconciling Next Team had its first of a series of three book discussions. WS church members and several members from Reformation Lutheran gathered together in the Wesley Room to discuss Religious Trauma: Queer Stories in Estrangement and Return by Brooklyn N. Peterson.

The discussion was led by Jim Lane, who disseminated information about the author and his stories. The group discussed the book, and some shared their own stories of religious trauma in their pasts.

The next book discussion will be held on Wednesday, July 26 at 6:00 pm in the Wesley Room and on Zoom. The group will be discussing Reclaiming Church by J.J. Warren.

The book addresses three points of importance to young people looking to be part of a church community and a call:

1. The identity and nature of God,

2. The role of Scripture in discerning God's call to serve God.

3. The author's own experience of God, church, and identity. In the final chapter, "We Are the Church," Warren focuses on practical and positive steps for joining voices, being heard, building bridges, and working together for young people to

reclaim Church in their lives. Key features of this book: * Affirms the LGBTQ community and those who love them that the Church is for all.

• Inspires younger progressive people to stay within the Church and work to renew the call of ministry.

• Explores the Church's beginnings and emphasis on community.

• Calls readers to focus on practical and positive steps to reclaim Church in their lives.
