## **Getting to Know...Pato Aravena**

he stereotypes about American society being closed and cold were shattered for Pato Aravena when he came to Washington Street UMC. He found our church to have a strong sense of family and a warm and friendly congregation.

"It felt like my home church in Chile," Pato said.

Pato came to Columbia to marry Elizabeth Lide who had been a participant in the church's Volunteers in Missions program in Santiago, Chile.

Pato was born and grew up in Curacautin, which had a population of about 12,000. In Chile, that's considered a city, while in the States it's a small town, Pato said.

Pato is a fourth-generation Methodist. His church was the first Protestant house of worship in his town.

After high school, Pato was a lay pastor in Patagonia for a year. Then he moved to Santiago where he was a web designer for the Methodist church. Part of his job included traveling around the country and consulting with local churches and national church institutions to get input for the website.

Asked where he got his computer skills, Pato replied, "self-taught." In high school, he and his friends would find a neighbor, a friend, or a friend of a friend with a computer. They would take turns for hours honing their skills.

Pato and Elizabeth met in the commons area of their seminary, or dorm. He wanted to practice his English. He taught her to play "El gorro de Lana" (the wool hat), a traditional folk song from southern Chile, on the guitar. They teamed up to help other volunteers with logistics and interpreting when they ventured out to meet with churches,

"We got to know each other a little bit more," Pato said. They started dating. They went to parks, to the botanical gardens, or to a convenience store to buy food for a picnic.

Pato took Elizabeth to his hometown

to meet his parents. This entailed a nine-hour bus ride, with the last hour on mountain roads. Elizabeth didn't get sick, but she felt sick.

"She didn't do well on the bus, but she still wanted to come," Pato said. "She's a keeper."

In Curacautin, Pato and Elizabeth stood on the flat roof of Pato's parents' house and picked cherries from a nearby tree. They ate the cherries and competed to see who could spit their pits the farthest.

Back in Santiago, Pato and Elizabeth sat at a table with children doing crafts.

"I knew she wasn't going to stay in Chile," Pato said.

He wrote her a note and passed it across the table. It read, "Would you like to marry me?" She read it, wrote "yes" and passed it back. As is customary in Chile, Pato and Elizabeth bought engagement rings to wear on their right hands. They were "very cheap rings" from a store, Pato said.

Pato came to the United States on September 1, 2005. He called his journey "a leap of faith." Pato lived with the Lides; he and Elizabeth had "two rooms but the same roof," he said.

Pato and Elizabeth married on March 26, 2006, at Washington Street. They wanted his parents to come to the wedding, but their visas were denied twice with no reason given. Later, his parents visited Columbia four times under a visa waiver program.

Pato enrolled right away in the English program for internationals at USC. Next, he went to Midlands Technical College to earn his core credits in math, English, science, and history. These were transferred to USC where he earned a bachelor's degree in music education. While he was at USC, Pato had a part-time job as an interpreter and translator for the state Department of Social Services. This work was done over the phone with the client and DSS.



In 2012, after he was certified to teach, Pato went to work as a music teacher at Windsor Elementary School in Richland Two. He is in charge of the morning show, produced by students over a closed-circuit TV system. He teaches his students songs, basic theory, rhythm, and lots of movement.

The third- through fifth-graders have computers and keyboards to compose their own beats and songs.

"I love it," Pato said of the job.
Some of the older kids ask him
if they may call him Mr. A. The first
syllable of his last name is pronounced
"air," not "are," and the e is a long e. He
tells them, no, if all the kindergarteners
can pronounce his name, they can too.

Pato and Elizabeth have three children: Alma Louise, 10; Rosemary, 8; and Teddy, 5. Pato said he enjoys watching his children develop as individuals. The girls are not carbon copies of one another, and Teddy isn't similar to his sisters, he said.

Ever since he was a baby, though, Teddy has wanted to be included in whatever the girls were doing, whether that be tea parties or dress up.

Pato said the most influential person in his life was his mother, Noemi, who

died of cancer in May 2020. He had gone to see her in March, and "two weeks after I arrived, everything shut down. It was like God was sending me there to stay with my mom and help her in any way I could."

Pato said his mother was a strong woman. She was a homemaker who stretched the budget by selling homemade baked goods when money was tight.

"She had a really good reputation (as a baker) and made good money," Pato said. His mom also had an amazing faith, Pato said.

"She was a prayer warrior," Pato said.

"She died with the conviction that she was in God's hands, that she was God's child."

In December 2018, Pato became a naturalized American citizen in a Charleston ceremony. His South Carolina family attended. Alma Louise and Rosemary were two of several children who led the pledge of allegiance. One of the first things Pato did after the ceremony was to go online and register to vote.

The next time he went to school, Pato had a special parking place marked by red, white, and blue balloons. When he stepped inside, he stepped onto a red carpet. Students lined the hall, clapping as he walked through the school. Elizabeth and the kids were there as was a television news camera. At the morning show, a teacher sang the national anthem. An ROTC group presented him with an American flag.

Although he felt somewhat embarrassed, Pato said he also felt honored and touched.

Pato has been a leader and interpreter for nine mission trips, five for USC's Methodist Student Network and four for Washington Street, including the most recent one to the Texas-Mexico border at McAllen/Rio Bravo.
