Many of us have great intentions to get together, to reach out, to get better acquainted with other Washington Street members beyond the pew that we sit in or our own Sunday School class. But sometimes our follow-through needs a little help! Whether making new friends or digging deeper with old friends, meeting over

a meal binds people in special ways.

Supper Clubs are gatherings of six to eight people who meet monthly in homes, restaurants or other places. Through this intentional group ministry, couples, families and individuals can connect with guests and members of WSUMC in the warmth of a casual setting while sharing a meal and fellowship. The meal, while nourishing, is not the focus—the focus is on hanging out, making new friends and digging deeper with old friends. As we hear each other's stories, we build trust, and eating together binds people in special ways. Gatherings are engaging, inclusive, participatory and serve to help us grow in our relationship with God and one another as names and faces become friends and prayer partners. When we meet each other in less formal, compassionate conversation, we learn how to love better. This love will help us grow into a personal, intimate relationship with Jesus. Groups are encouraged to meet for six months.

because it not only teaches us about God and helps us develop a vibrant relationship with the Lord but also enables us to grow closer to each other in special and meaningful ways," said Rev. Alston Lippert. Achieving both of these outcomes takes time, so the group will meet for 34 weeks—basically a school year. There will be independent readings six days a week, along with a 2-hour group on Sunday afternoons at 5:15 pm. (Note: For all the SC WBB fans, Rev. Alston has season tickets, and the time will "float" depending on the Sunday game times.) We hope you will prayerfully consider joining Rev. Alston and Lee Smith on this journey. Book Discussions

The first series will be entitled, "Taking Care and Paying Attention: Lessons from Literature;" Sept. 13—Session 1: *Foster*, by Claire Keegan (This is the lovely little novel that the film "The Quiet Girl" is based on);

Oct. 11—Session 2: *Selected Poems* by Mary Oliver and Robert Frost; Session 3—*Everyday Use* and *Nineteen Fifty-Five*, by Alice Walker

The idea is to look at three different genres: the novel, poetry, and the short story. The works selected convey ideas about what it means to take care of others and to be alert to their needs or what it means to pay attention to the natural world and to learn from it.

While the books this group chooses to read may include books that can be easily labeled "Christian" or "Spiritual," we recognize that the Bible itself is actually not a single book, but a library of 66 books and

it includes various genres including poetry, apocalyptic writings, and parables. Thus, by reading various genres of literature, not just within the Bible, but in other works, we will become better readers of the Bible. For example, reading books of poems, discussing, and understanding their structure, can help us read and better understand the poetry of the Psalms. While many of our Sunday morning classes regularly read and discuss books to deepen their spiritual lives, Sunday mornings can be so busy that our conversations can feel rushed. As a result, we are often left craving a deeper dialogue and relationship with others. As Karen Swallow Prior notes in her book, *On Reading Well*, "Great books offer perspectives more than lessons. Literature shows us how a different character, situation, and event seems from different angles and perspectives, and even then how inexact our knowledge remains." Thus, discussing a novel's or a short story's themes and characters, plot, and style or a poem's imagery and structure allows us to open up and engage in more personal conversations—conversations that help us to grow in our faith and understanding and strengthen our sense of community.
