Mural Dedicated to the Memory of Rick Rowe

That a privilege to be a small part of the festivities surrounding the dedication of the mural "Earth Medicine," created by Tennessee muralist Eric Finley and dedicated to the memory of Washington Street United Methodist member, Rick Rowe. The mural, adorning two sides of Trustus Theatre, located at

520 Lady Street in the Vista in downtown Columbia, was formally dedicated on Tuesday, November 14, at the site. The mural was commissioned by the Vista Neighborhood Association, in collaboration with Trustus, One Columbia for Arts & Culture, and the Vista Guild.

Rowe, who passed in April, was a prolific leader in the Vista where he founded the Vista Neighborhood Association, was the President of the Renaissance Plaza Homeowners' Association, and served on Trustus and Vista Guild Board of Directors, among many other things.

Rick lived his values fully, no compromise. The power of creating community and belonging were at the top of his priority list, his wish list for the world. One section of the mural exhibits a beautiful forest filled with a community of transparent dwellings, a place where people feel connected, protected, safe. Rick was awarded a purple heart for his service in Vietnam, an honor given to service members who have greatly sacrificed themselves. Rick fought to both protect and

to preserve freedom through enriching his community, and assuring each individual is afforded basic human rights. He was fair, he listened, he sympathized and empathized. You knew it when you were with him. But he rarely, if ever, touted his own horn. Rick gave such passion and credibility to the power of place.

Researcher and Storyteller Brené Brown says, "True belonging is the spiritual practice of believing in and belonging to yourself so deeply that you can share your most authentic self with the world and find sacredness in both being a part of something and standing alone in the wilderness." During 2022, the VITA (volunteer income tax assistance) volunteers completed and filed 8,256 tax returns (for free) which brought \$11.6M in refunds to families and individuals in our community. The average income for these clients was \$19,354.






Successful Drive n' Drop Held
