Rosenwald Schools

he Rosenwald rural school building program, which began in 1912 was a major effort to improve the quality of public education for African Americans in the early 20th-century South. These schools were built through grants funded by Julius Rosenwald, president of Sears, Roebuck and Company. By 1928, one in every five rural schools for Black students in the South was a Rosenwald school, and these schools housed one third of the region's Black school children. There were nearly 500 Rosenwald schools built in South

Carolina in the early 1900s (1917-1932), but due to development, sprawl, and neglect, only 40 remain standing in various states of repair.

Conservation Voters of South Carolina (CVSC), the WeGOJA Foundation, the African American Heritage Commission, Rosenwald community groups, and other state and local partners have formed a working group to initiate the protection of Rosenwald School sites across the state.

The Pine Grove School, built in 1923, was one of 15 other Rosenwald Schools constructed in Richland County. It is believed to be the only one still standing. Through funding secured from the

South Carolina Community Competitive Grant Program, Richland County Conservation Commission, and the Lowe's Charitable and Educational Preservation Fund through the Richland County Recreation Foundation, Richland County has worked to restore the school to its original configuration and successfully created a historic community gathering place. In 2009, the school received its National Register designation and has received a Historic Preservation Award from the Historic Columbia Foundation.

In July 2023, members of WSUMC's Racial Justice Action Team visited the Pine Grove School. During this visit, a former student joined the group and shared her perspective on how important these schools were to the students and the community. Additional information learned during visit:



• Communities were given half the funds to build the school and they had to raise the other half. This was not an easy task for poor, rural Black families, but because they felt so strongly about their children's education, they did everything they could to raise the money. They sold quilts and other items, some provided labor and materials, while others even donated family land.

• The total cost to build the Pine Grove School was \$2,500, which was composed of

This school, built in 1923 at a cost of \$2,500, is one of 500 African-American schools in S.C. funded in part by the Julius Rosenwald Foundation from 1917 to 1932. It is a two-room school typical of smaller Rosenwald schools. From 1923 to 1950 an average of 40-50 students a year attended this school, in grades 1-7.

Sunday School Updates Meetings & Events contributions from the Rosenwald Fund, \$700, the white community, \$315, the Black community, \$285, and the public contribution was \$1,200.

- After the school was closed, the community raised money \$20 from each family to purchase the land from the public school district. They used the building to hold community events and meetings.
- A group called the Big Sisters Club helped to support the school for over 44 years. They were instrumental in getting the school year extended from four months to six months.
- Fathers of the students served as trustees of the school.

With another General Conference for our United Methodist denomination scheduled to take place April 23-May 3, we find ourselves yearning to embrace love more completely because God first loved us. Thus, knowing that this year Ash Wednesday is the same day as St. Valentine's Day (February 14), it a perfect day for us to start our Lenten season thinking about and having discussions about what love means.

These services are designed for us not only worship together midweek, but also as an opportunity for us to invite others in the community to take time out of their week to pause, find refreshment, and be reminded of God's love and our purpose in this world. This year, in these services, in addition to beautiful music, a different member of WSUMC's drama ministry will present a dramatic monologue from the perspective of a biblical character who participated in the Passion of our Lord.
