

Celebrating Women's History Month

n 1956, General Conference approved the full ordination of women (after voting it down at every General Conference for 100 years). Rev. Patricia Parrish told me that she had a copy of her grandfather's Book of Discipline from 1956 and she has that section underlined.

Thanks to Rev. Diana Westerkam for the following firsts after the vote for full ordination, as we honor these women:

• 1967: Anne Porter Brown becomes the General Secretary of the Board of Global Ministries and the first woman to hold an official, major leadership position in any mainline Christian denomination.

• 1970: Sheila Rogers becomes the first woman ordained Deacon in the SC Conference.

• 1972: General Conference creates the Commission on the Role and Status of Women.

• 1974: Vivian McFadden becomes the first woman to be ordained elder in the SC Conference.

• 1980: Majorie Matthews becomes the first woman to be elected to the Office of Bishop in any major Christian denomination.

• 1986: Gloria Davis becomes the first woman appointed as a District Superintendent in the SC Conference.

• 2004: Mary Virginia Taylor becomes the first woman to be appointed to serve as resident Bishop of the SC Annual Conference.

As I was thinking about Women's History Month, I thought about the seven women ministers who have served at Washington St. UMC and how we can honor them. I asked church members to reflect on what each minister's ministry meant to WSUMC and to them personally. In the following pages, we honor these special women and the dates they served:

Patricia Parrish: First woman appointed to WSUMC as Senior Pastor, 2016-2021

was so pleased a woman was appointed to serve as Senior Pastor and I just knew she would be special. The Church approved the Renewal 2020 plan the year before her appointment, and we looked to the future with hope. Patricia embraced the plan with ideas and a new structure for the ministry teams. Little did we know then that the church would face two challenging events



in the next few years. Patricia led us through those dark days with hope, grace, kindness, and action. The 2019 General Conference voted to keep the harmful LGBTQIA+ language in the *Book of Discipline*. My first reaction was to leave the church because the decision was so hurtful. She comforted me and other members even though she was hurting too. She responded quickly to the media and formed a General Conference Response team that led to the church becoming a Reconciling Church in the summer of 2019. There were different opinions and pain for all. She actively listened to and respected all sides. Her calm and peaceful demeanor and willingness to listen kept peace in the congregation during the discernment process.

A year later, the church shut down due to COVID. Again, Patricia took quick action to lead us in on-line worship and kept Sunday school classes and small groups going through taping and zoom. With the help of Alston, Jane, Lynn, Grant, Rick, Louis and choir members, we had on-line services that had beautiful images, music, and powerful sermons that were so meaningful to me. She even spearheaded the outdoor services that came later. I can imagine what a toll these events had on her, yet you would not know it. She always had a smile and a twinkle in her eyes as she thought about ways to move forward. I once heard Patricia say that the seeds we sow now will bloom and we will see the fruit of our work, and we are! Patricia, thank you my friend for your dedication to justice, love, worship, and so much more! It would take many pages to write it all down.

eal and I started attending services at WSUMC during a period of transition in our lives. We had both attended church only sporadically as adults. She led a class on what it meant to be a Methodist that met for several weeks, and her discussion helped us understand and become more comfortable with making the commitment to become members of the church and for me to publicly confess Jesus Christ as my Savior. Susan did not have a long tenure at our church, but I will be forever grateful that she was there at the right time for us.

e first met Diana in 1992 when she became one of our ministers at WSUMC. Her soft-spoken nature and small physical stature didn't prepare us, or Washington Street, for the powerful and long-lasting influence she would have on our lives and on the life of this church. are all hallmarks of her ministry at WS.

Some of our special memories from Diana's ministry years at WS include her deeply meaningful sermons, her eloquent and beautiful prayers (which we've encouraged her to compile in a book!), challenging and enlightening Bible studies, the Walks through Holy Week (bringing the story alive for the children of WSUMC), Easter morning butterfly releases (how did the timing always work out?), and stories and laughter shared over many meals. Her impact on our faith journeys is second only to that of our mothers, as she consistently models

a life based on Jesus's radical teachings about love, compassion, acceptance, and forgiveness. Our lives continue to be blessed by Diana's presence in them; as a pastor, a teacher, and a very dear friend.

Rev. Toni White, first woman minister appointed to WSUMC, 1977-1981

n 1977 Toni White came to WSUMC as Minister of Education and Outreach and to show boys and girls that ---yes --- girls can be really good ministers. All eyes were on Toni for her first sermon; she did not disappoint. She even survived the old ladies scolding her for wearing open-toed shoes beneath her vestments. (The scolding had no effect.)



Toni had a gift for speaking the right words at the right moment. Even beyond her years employed by WS, she has been called upon to preach, funeralize, comfort, teach and pray for our members.

Toni has long worked for equality and social justice. I recall her calming presence during a nighttime vigil for the Equal Rights Amendment in the early 1980s when we were threatened with violence. Toni, always a healer, never hesitates to bring food or visit the hospital when called. As members of an informal women's group sometimes referred to as "The Cult," Toni and I have been connected for over 40 years. I am lucky indeed to call her my friend.

Many thanks to Lee Smith, Deborah Rowe, Andrea McAtee, Lynn Shirley, Kimberly McAlister, Eva Nance and Malissa Burnette for these powerful and moving descriptions of these beautiful, trailblazing women. Most still attend WSUMC on a regular basis. Rev. Patricia Parrish is retired and living in Lake Junalaska. Rev. Susan Culler is the senior Pastor at Whaley St. UMC in Columbia. WSUMC Makes Plans for General Conference

s we have been hearing for months now, United Methodists from around the world will gather in Charlotte, NC, April 23-May 3 for the postponed 2020 General Conference. As this significant event, postponed due to COVID-19, approaches, United Methodist congregations must prepare thoughtfully and prayerfully.

To help us all become informed about the significance of General Conference decisions, we are setting up a special page on the church website (wsmethodist.org) that includes information about General Conference including links to proposed legislation and the names and email addresses of SC delegates. There will also be a link on the page to the March 17th presentation on General Conference given at WSUMC by retired Bishop Ken Carder and a short video explaining what General Conference is and why it is important. This page should be live no later than April 5th at wsmethodist. org/gc.

Knowing that legislation passed in previous General Conferences and proposed legislation in front of this year's Conference has caused divisions and pain in our church and caused members to leave the United Methodist Church, we are called not just to be informed about the proposed legislation, but to also commit ourselves to times of intentional prayer and listening. To that end, from March 30 through April 22, The SC Conference Bishop, L. Jonathan Holston, and members of the South Carolina Conference Delegation to General Conference will share a video prayer at 8:24 p.m. These 24 days of prayer will be posted via Facebook (@scumc), Instagram (@umcsc), and X (@umcsc), and by email to all who are signed up to receive conference news emails. They will also be posted on the conference website (umcsc.org). These moments of prayer will be focused on praying for the church and specifically for groups of people who have been preparing for General Conference and who will participate in the discussions and voting.

Beginning on Sunday, April 7th through Sunday, June 23, immediately following each Sunday's worship service, we will open Christ Chapel for personal sharing and prayer. Some of the ordained clergy in our congregation will be available in the chapel each week to listen and pray with persons from noon-12:45. Individual prayer guides will also be available for those who wish to simply sit in the chapel and engage in a time of personal prayer.
