Six Things to Know about our Soup Cellar

The Soup Cellar, located on the Marion Street side of the church, opened on October 15, 1979. Twelve people were served on the first day. Fast forward 45 years: an average of 121 meals are served each day, five days a week. During the first year, only Washington Street staff and members of the congregation served the meals. Today, 13 churches, along with a group from the Methodist Student Network at USC and a group of women who call themselves Proverbs 31, send volunteers.

- The Soup Cellar is funded completely by donations from churches, organizations, and individual donors. It obtains food at a minimal cost from the Harvest Hope Food Bank through two federal programs. Additional food and supplies are purchased using donations. On November 3 and November 10, women from the Toni White Circle will be handing out paper grocery bags for members of the congregation to fill with items from a Soup Cellar wish list stapled to the bags. On November 17, the bags will be returned to the altar. In addition to food, checks are also appreciated.
- Terrence Chisolm, the Soup Cellar manager, calls himself a creative cook. Before coming to Washington Street, Terrence cooked for 2,500 soldiers at Fort Jackson and then at the DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel on Bush River Road, among other places.
- When the pandemic hit in March 2020, the Soup Cellar switched from a sit-down lunch to a takeout bag lunch without soup. Church volunteers stopped coming. A couple of months into the pandemic, when the doors were reopened for lunch, a crowd began chanting, "We want soup. We want soup." Ever since, the Soup Cellar has served soup on most days.
