



The Four Pillars of The Church

A diagram depicting the Four Pillars of the Church can have many purposes, according to Lee Haynes, chairman of the Church Council.

- If you are a new member of Washington Street, it might be able to help show you where you want to participate.
- If you have been a member for a while, it might suggest a new area of activity.
- It also lets everyone know what our tithes and offerings are being put towards.

As we emerged from the pandemic a couple of years ago, the Church Council renewed the visioning efforts it had started in the Renewal 2020 plan.


The diagram grew out of these goal-

setting exercises. Lee drew the picture, and Revs. Becky and Alston signed off on it.

"I'm a very visual person," Lee said, and the diagram shows how "everything we do lines up and works together." The Four Pillars are Worship, Age-Level, Community, and Church & Society. Each pillar has a number of ministries under it and a ministry coordinator, who is a member of the congregation. The pillars also have one or more staff members assigned to them.

The level under the pillars consists of staff, committees, and groups that act as the "foundation" of the church, Lee said. Lee grew up in the Methodist church, and he never knew any of this until he became involved as an adult, he said. "If you just come and participate on Sunday morning, you may not know many of these things are going on," he said. The Church Council meets the third week of each even month, starting in February, The meetings are conducted over ZOOM, and members of the congregation are welcome to attend.

Our Journey with a Refugee Family: Lessons in Compassion and Friendship



WSUMC, supported by the Circle of Welcome (COW), had the honor of helping Lutheran Services Carolinas support a Rohingya family from Myanmar settle into our community. The government of Myanmar has, for years, worked to eliminate the Rohingya people. Our family of two parents and three children truly needed a safe country!

When the family arrived, we eagerly welcomed them with open arms. From the very start, our congregation and the COW members were determined to support them in every way.

In January, we met them at the airport with food and clothes, helping them feel at home right away. Thanks to our supportive congregation, their new apartment was fully furnished, including a washer and dryer. We accompanied them to medical appointments and English as a Second Language (ESL) classes, and helped their two oldest children enroll in school. We offered English tutoring and driver's training. In

addition, we celebrated their successes, milestones, and birthdays, sharing in their joys and achievements. In return, this family gave us more than we could have imagined. We became more aware of the challenges refugees face and their incredible resilience. Their courage to start anew, often with limited language skills, was truly inspiring. Even with so little, they thanked us at every visit by sharing their food, demonstrating their generosity of spirit.

Their gratitude and appreciation deepened our understanding of their culture and the Muslim faith. We formed genuine friendships that will last well beyond our formal six-month support period. Although our official time together has ended, many of us continue to offer English tutoring and support, keeping the connection alive.

Through this experience, we are reminded of the impact of community and the mutual enrichment that comes from supporting each other.

We are happy to report that the family is thriving. They are part of a supportive community of Rohingya refugees in their apartment complex and go out of their way to welcome new refugees as they arrive. The father performed well at his first job and then successfully found new employment that allows him to work a day shift. The two oldest children are doing well in elementary school and the mother is diligently learning English.
